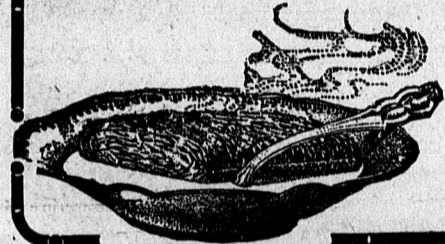

P. E. ISLANDER, PRESIDENT.—"Better housing in Canada" is the title under which the Toronto Housing Company, Limited, issues its first annual report. This report is an especially interesting one, giving details of a system adopted in Ontario, through which, with the co-operation of the provincial government, it is hoped to enable people of ordinary means to own their homes. The company is capitalized at \$1,000,000, the provincial government guaranteeing its bonds to the value of \$850,000, upon the basis of \$150,000 being provided by the company. Mr. G. Frank Beer, formerly of Charlottetown, is President of the company.

THE GOLDEN ROAD.—The Worcester Post says:—"The Golden Road," just published by L. C. Page & Co., limited, of Boston, completes the sixth volume of fiction written by Mrs. Ewen McDonald, formerly Miss L. M. Montgomery, Cavendish, P. E. I. It is a sequel of her book, "The Story Girl," which at the outset became one of the best sellers, and it is even more delightful to the lover of healthful and elevating fiction. The various scenes of the author's theme, as in her former books, still remain in her beloved Prince Edward Island, the beauty and natural scenery of which make the golden province the source of soul-lifting inspiration. The enamouring character of "The golden road" is perhaps stronger than that of her former books, the sales of which have passed the half-million mark—one of which necessitated 32 printings. Mrs. McDonald has long since acquired a reputation that has made that detestable "returned with thanks an utter impossibility with her, but on the contrary, the dubious publishers have invited her to come from the narrow confines of her island home as their guest to mingle with the society authors of the cultured cities of New England. Mrs. McDonald is well known in Worcester and was tendered a reception here by her friends on the afternoon of November 14, 1910, while a guest of her Boston publisher.

A terribly sad fatality occurred at Point Tryon on Monday last when little Blanche O'Reilly, aged five and a half years, was so badly burned that she lived only a few hours.

About 9 o'clock, while the inmates of the house were absent, with the exception of the child's mother who was in bed, the little one got out of bed and went to the kitchen. A spark from the stove evidently caught in her nightdress and when her mother, alarmed by the child's screams, came to her assistance she found her enveloped in flames. The mother did what she could to smother the flames, and in doing so received severe burns, but before she finally succeeded the child was terribly burned all over the body.

Dr. Boyer of Crapaud was at once sent for but when he arrived he saw

that the case was absolutely hopeless. The little one lived till ten o'clock at night her suffering mercifully relieved by unconsciousness during the last few hours.

THE BRANT.—The D.G.S. Brant yesterday went out and picked up the last of the Bay buoys and brought it in to Charlottetown. This morning she will be engaged in lifting the buoys in the Charlottetown harbor.

THE LADY LAURIER.—Yesterday morning the Dominion Government buoy steamer Lady Laurier left Charlottetown in order to proceed to Magdalen Islands to pick up the buoy from North Cape which had broken away a couple of weeks ago and drifted down to the Magdalenes. But the weather became so thick and dirty that the steamer was forced to put in to St. Peters harbor and seek safe anchorage there for some time.

WINTER MAIL SERVICE.—It is likely that the D. G. S. Minto will within the next week proceed to Summerside in connection with the winter mail service—between that port and Cape Tormentine on the mainland. Her running time on this service will be as follows: She will leave Summerside at eight o'clock in the morning on the arrival of the mail special from Charlottetown, and will leave Tormentine on the arrival of the mail train from Sackville, which will be about noon.

The sympathy of their many friends is extended to Mr. and Mrs. T. M. Howatt of Coleman, who on Monday the 17th of November, had the misfortune to lose through illness their youngest daughter, Beulah Louise, at the early age of nineteen months. On Tuesday morning after a service conducted at their home by the Rev. Mr. Murray of O'Leary, the remains were taken by train to Summerside, and from there by hearse to the home of Mr. John Clarke, Cape Traverse, where, after services by the Rev. James McDougall, were concluded, they were laid to rest by the side of the brothers, who had been called before. Only six weeks ago, Mrs. Howatt's mother, Mrs. A. C. McKinnon, passed away so that within a very short time the family has been doubly bereaved.

WEDDING BELLS.—St. Malachia's Church, Kinkora, was the scene of a very happy event on Tuesday morning, November 25th, when Laura Mary Noonan, youngest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Noonan, Albany was united in the holy bonds of matrimony to Mr. Arthur Chestley Green, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Green, Central Bedeque. The ceremony was performed by the pastor, Rev. J. J. McDonald. The bride, who was becomingly attired in a navy-blue, tailored suit, with hat to match, was attended by Miss Faun Green, sister of the groom. Mr. Gratton Noonan, brother of the bride acted as groomsman. After the ceremony the happy couple left by the morning train for Charlottetown, returning in the evening to the home of the bride, where a reception was held. The number of beautiful presents received by the bride and groom testify to the high esteem in which they are held. Their many friends join in wishing them a happy and prosperous journey through life.

The funeral of J. Emmet Doyle who died at Swift Current General Hospital of pneumonia on Nov. 17th took place at Bradalbane on Tuesday the 25th inst. 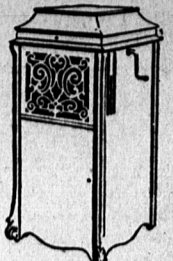
