C. G. S. PRINCE EDWARD.—The car-ferry steamer, owing to a belated train did not leave Pictou yesterday until 11 a. m. She reached Georgetown about 2.35. The mail special reached the city at 5.25 p. m.

RECRUITING FOR NAVY.—Number of recruits enlisted in the royal navy throughout the Dominion, up to February 15th, are 1,023, made up as follows: Charlottetown, 30; Sydney, 21; St. John, N. B., 50; Halifax, 57; Toronto, 478; Winnipeg, 183; Virginia, 65; Edmonton, 88; Vancouver, 148; Esquimaut, 19.

SOUSA OFFERS HIS SERVICES.—Word comes from Chicago that John Philip Sousa has been among the first to volunteer his services to the government. The popular march king was formerly bandmaster of the United States Marine band, and he has offered his services to the war office in the capacity of organizer or bandmaster, if desired.

THE CAPES SERVICE.—There were crossings both ways at the Capes yesterday notwithstanding the thick weather. The boats left Cape Traverse at 12 o'clock and reached the opposite side at 4 p. m. They took over fifty sacks of mail. The boats which left Tormentine at 7 a. m. got over about 11 o'clock. They brought no mail to this side as it came by way of Pictou.

HORSE RACES.—The races at Bonshaw on Saturday afternoon owing to a like event on Clyde River ice, did not have many entries. Two horses made their appearances, "Nellie," owned by Bonshaw's General Store, and "Little Suek II," owned by Mr. Daniel McPhail, Bonshaw. The race was won by "Nellie" in good time in three straight heats. Mr. McPhail was at a disadvantage owing to his speed sleigh being undergoing repairs. He expects to have his regular trotting outfit in readiness for the next race, which will take place on Wednesday afternoon the 21st inst. and will make things lively for all colliers.

BANK APPOINTMENT.—The St. John Globe says that J. A. McLeod, chief superintendent of branches of the Bank of Nova Scotia, has been appointed as assistant general manager of that institution, in succession to Mr. Daniel Waters, who is retiring after a long period of most valued service. Mr. Waters, who is a native of Middlesex county, has been connected with the Bank of Nova Scotia in all for 37 years. Mr. McLeod hails from P. E. Island. His association with the bank has been one of steady progress. He entered the service at the branch at Summerside, P. E. Island, over 30 years ago as a junior clerk. Much of his later banking experience was gained in the United States. At intervals he was manager of the branches at Boston and Chicago. He was also manager of the branches at St. John's, Nfld., and Havana, Cuba. Mr. McLeod has been connected with the head office for the past five years.

VALENTINE TEA.—Three very pleasant hours were spent at "Hillside Cottage" the home of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Bagnall, Hazel Grove, on Wednesday afternoon, when their daughter Mary, wishing to do something to help the Prisoner of War Fund gave a Valentine Tea from three to six. Assisting Miss Bagnall in the tea room were Mrs. Warren of New Glasgow; Mrs. J. McLeod; Miss Joste Bagnall and Mrs. Mutart of Cape Traverse. Quite a number from Hunter River, Fredericton and other places dropped in during the afternoon and partook of the dainty tea. Music was supplied in the drawing room by Mrs. Rogerson and Miss Mary McGulgan. Many pieces of silver aggregating a nice sum were dropped into the Valentine Box. It is understood that Mrs. Wray intends giving a St. Patrick's Tea on the 17th of March and it is hoped it may be as successful as the Valentine Tea was.

MRS. JOHN BROOKS.

The funeral of the late Mrs. Brooks, beloved wife of Mr. John Brooks, of Poplar Grove, P. E. I., took place on the 28th ult., and was largely attended. The funeral service at the Methodist Church, Bideford, were conducted by Rev. H. S. Young and interment was made in the cemetery at that place. Mrs. Brooks was a daughter of the late Wm. Paugh of East Bideford. She was twenty-six years of age.

MRS. ELLSWORTH GILLIS.

At Ellerslie, Jan. 17th, 1917, Mrs. Ellsworth Gillis aged 88 years, departed this life after a lingering illness, during which she was a great sufferer. Some time ago she underwent an operation at the Prince Co. Hospital. The operation was successful and she was apparently on the way to recovery but after returning to her home at Ellerslie her health failed and finally the end came. The funeral took place on Jan. 19th, burial at the Methodist Cemetery, Bideford.

MR. ALEXANDER MACDONALD.

After a few months illness which he bore with Christian patience and resignation to the Divine Will, Mr. Alexander Macdonald, one of the oldest and most respected residents of Lorne Valley passed away on Thursday, February the 8th instant aged 84. Deceased was a native of Portree Isle of Skye, Scotland and emigrated to P. E. Island in the year 1858 at the age of twenty-six, settling at Lorne Valley where he engaged in farming. His funeral took place to Lorne Valley cemetery on Saturday the 10th inst. The services at the house and the grave were conducted by Rev. Wm. R. Macgillivray (McCaughy), Mr. Wright of Montague in the absence of his own pastor, Rev. Mr. McVicar of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Cardigan. The pall bearers were: Angus McLeod, John McPhee, Roderick McSwain, Neil McCannell, Thomas Shepherd and Allan Macdonald. The late Mr. Macdonald enjoyed the respect and esteem of all who knew him and his death leaves a vacant place in the home circle and the community which cannot be filled.
