comes who puts the emphasis on the failures it is only fair in the interests of a true conception of the work that his opinions be given on their full value.

Such is the method in the written record of God's first foreign missionary. His Son, Among his converts were: Peter, who denied Him in the hour of His need; Judas, who sold Him for thirty pieces of silver, Thomas who would not believe in His resurrection, unless he had proven it to his own satisfaction, though he had the words of his fellow disciples. The Scriptures chronicle the defections as well as the successes. What of Paul and his tribulations with his first converts? The Corinthian letters and Ephesian Christians had their apostates licentiousness, fickleness, bigotry and the gain derivative from the worship of the old gods and goddesses were too much for some of them. The Scriptures chronicle these failures. The speakers and writers on Foreign Missions have observed these modern Peter's, Judases, Galatians and Corinthians are certainly not without good authority for stating their views, partially for that they may be.

If Mr. Christie had read the two preceding paragraphs of the review of my remarks as carefully as the first I think he would not have come to the conclusion that he did. While admitting the truth in the statements made I showed that they were only partially true. The evidence on which they were based was only one side of the case. There were three defects. First, a lack of the historic sense; the second, a lack of the Christian sense; the third, a lack of the Roman and Barbarian sense. The Roman and Barbarian sense is enough justification for the contention that Christian Missions will not accomplish the same thing among all other peoples and religions. Secondly, a lack of the historic sense; it was three hundred years before Christianity won over the Roman people and governments. Modern missions are merely one hundred years old and only with the present generation have they been well organized and set on a strong basis. Thirdly, (which was not reported), the message of Christ has elements in it which are absolutely necessary for human welfare and happiness, physical and spiritual. All other religions lack some of these elements and so Christianity and Christian Missions are necessarily most appealing to the followers of all other faiths. That is not assenting to any means to the claims of the critics of missions.
