

Important Train Changes Effective From May 24th

(EXCEPT SUNDAY) DOUBLE DAILY SERVICE TO MAINLAND IN EFFECT. Trains leave Charlottetown at 6.45 A.M. and 10.15 A.M. The 6.45 train carries Pullman car direct to Montreal making connections at Emerald Junction as usual for passengers from Summerside. This train connects with the noon train at Sackville for Halifax as well as early afternoon trains for Montreal. The 10.15 A.M. train connects at Royalty Junction for passengers from Souris, Georgetown, and Montague and connects at Emerald Junction for passengers from Summerside and points west. This train makes connection at Sackville with the late afternoon Scotian train for Halifax and with the evening Maritime Express for Montreal.

NEW SERVICE SUMMERSIDE-CHARLOTTETOWN. Leave Summerside 7.10 A.M. arrive Charlottetown 9.25 A.M. Leave Charlottetown 3.30 P.M. arrive Summerside 10.40 P.M. Through express train each way. Night train leaves Charlottetown 3.30 P.M.

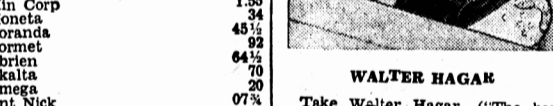

NATIONAL SELECTIVE SERVICE

Second Compulsory Employment Transfer Order

Notice to Certain Employers and Employees Notice is hereby given that men employed in certain specified lines of civilian employment, who are in age and marital classes already designated under National Selective Service Mobilization Regulations, must report for interview not later than June 15th, 1943, to an Employment and Selective Service Office.

A. Objective: This Second Order makes available for essential employments the services of men in age and marital classes designated as callable for Military Training under National Selective Service Mobilization Regulations, who are presently employed in the non-essential employments now specified.

B. EMPLOYMENTS COVERED BY THIS ORDER: Men, of the specified categories, are covered if now employed in any of the following: (1) Any occupation in or associated with retail stores; (2) any occupation in or associated with the manufacturing of feathers, plumes and artificial flowers; chewing gum; wine; lace goods; greeting cards; jewelry; (3) any occupation in or associated with distilling alcohol for beverage; (4) any occupation in or associated with the factory production of statuary and art goods; (5) any occupation in the operation of ice cream parlours and soda fountains; (6) any of the following occupations: bus boys; charmen and cleaners; custom furriers; dancing teachers; dish washers; doormen and starters; greens keepers; grounds keepers; porters (other than in railway train service); private chauffeurs.

C. AGE AND MARITAL CLASSES OF MEN COVERED BY THIS ORDER: (a) Every man born in any year from 1917 to 1924 (inclusive) who has reached age 19. (b) Every man born from 1902 to 1916 (inclusive) who, at July 15th, 1940, was: (i) unmarried; or (ii) divorced or judicially separated; or (iii) a widower without child or children. (c) Every man born from 1902 to 1916 (inclusive) who has, since July 15, 1940, become a widower without child or children now living. (d) Every man born from 1902 to 1916 (inclusive) who, since July 15, 1940, has been divorced or judicially separated.

D. Procedure to be Followed: All men as defined above must report to an Employment and Selective Service Office not later than June 15th, 1943. Men resident outside a city or town having an Employment and Selective Service Office, who are too far removed to call personally, may write to the nearest office in the first instance, and await further directions.

E. OBLIGATIONS OF EMPLOYERS: When directed to accept employment, subsequent to the interview referred to, men described in Paragraphs B and C above are required by the Regulations to follow the direction given.

F. OBLIGATIONS OF EMPLOYERS: It will be illegal for an employer to retain in his employ after June 15th, 1943, any men referred to in Paragraph C above, at any of the employment set forth in Paragraph B above, unless a special permit has been obtained from a National Selective Service Officer, permitting such action.

G. Transportation: Special provisions will be made for the transportation of men moved to work at a new place of residence.

H. Appeals: If directed to transfer to employment subsequent to interview, a man may, if he objects, enter appeal with a Court of Referees, within 7 days of receiving such direction.

I. Penalties in Case of Employers: Penalties are provided for any employer who retains in, or takes into, his employ after June 15th, 1943, any man covered by the Order, except under special permit.

J. Penalties in Case of Employees: Penalties are provided for failure on the part of any employed man affected, to register under this Order, or to follow a subsequent direction to employment, and in addition to other penalties, refusal to comply renders a man liable to compulsory labour service in an Alternative Service Work Camp.

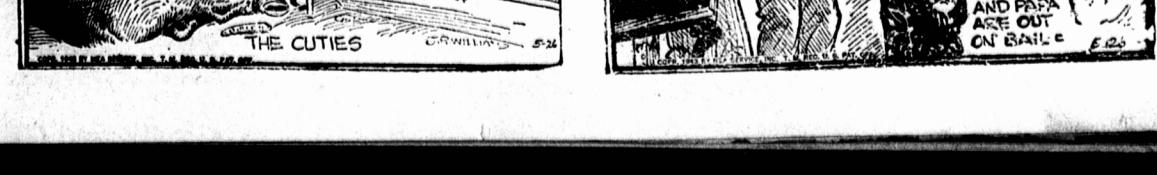
Floods Continue In U.S. States

CHICAGO, May 24 (AP)—Recessions upstream narrowed the United States mid-western flood zone today but torrents of water poured through and over dikes and forced hundreds of families to join the homeless multitudes. The Missouri eased down toward its bed. The danger thus was concentrated along a 125-mile stretch of the Mississippi from St. Louis to Cape Girardeau, Mo., and along a 100-mile reach of the Illinois from below Peoria to the confluence with the Mississippi. The Red Cross estimated that more than 10,000 families—roughly about 160,000 persons—were routed or otherwise affected by the inundation. The United States army reported that almost 10,000 troops had been assigned to rescue, relief and other duties in the imperilled areas. A focal point of anxiety was Beardstown, Ill. The Illinois river there inched up to 29.45 feet and continued to rise toward the top of the dike—a seawall surmounted by a makeshift barricade that will protect the city until the water reaches the 30-foot level, if the barrier holds.

Graydon Raises Question Of Seed Potato Supply

OTTAWA, May 24 (CP)—Gordon Graydon, Progressive Conservative House leader, said in the House of Commons anxiety over the supply of seed potatoes is prevalent in Canada, and an early statement on the situation should be made by the Government. Mr. Graydon supported L. E. Cardiff (Prog. Con. Huron North) who asked for information if seed potatoes were so labelled when sold, and if a ceiling price had been imposed on such potatoes. Finance Minister Ilsley said he would make inquiry on the questions raised.
