HAMILTON, Bermuda, Feb. 18.—Herbert L. Stone, chairman of the committee to arrange a yacht race from America to Bermuda the coming season, here in conference with Eldon Trimmingham, commodore of the Royal Bermuda Yacht Club, has completed arrangements for a race from New London, Conn., to Bermuda, starting June 12. Sixteen entries have been received for the event, including one from Toronto.

**R. M. Johnston's Appeal Dismissed**

OTTAWA, Feb. 20.—Appeal of R. M. Johnston against the decision of Saskatchewan courts unseating him from the federal seat for Moose Jaw was dismissed from Supreme Court. A new election must now be held in Moose Jaw.

Charges against Johnston were made false returns, omitting several election expenses, including hiring band, paying meals.

**Billiard Champion**

MONTREAL, Feb. 17.—Arnold Ibbotson, of this city, retained his title as the English billiard champion of Canada when he defeated Ernest A. Leigh also of this city, in their six thousand point title match which was concluded after five days' play here, last night. The scores announced at the end of the match were: Ibbotson 6,001; Leigh 5,951.

Leigh made the highest run of the tournament when he scored 161 before missing.

**Sir Thomas Roddick Died in Montreal**

MONTREAL, Feb. 20.—Sir Thomas Roddick, noted surgeon and twice member of Parliament, also first colonial president of the British Medical Association, died here today with arterio sclerosis.

He was born at Harbor Grace, Newfoundland, in 1846, and was educated at Truro and McGill.

**TOO MUCH SILVER**

LONDON, Feb. 21.—London banks are overflowing with silver, much so that they are embarrassed for facilities to handle the huge amounts which have been deposited with them. It is estimated that there is twice as much silver in circulation in England as there is necessary for the 60,000,000 pounds' worth of coined silver which is needed during the war but today the banks are at their wits' end as to what to do with it. The vaults of many banks are filled, and it has been whispered that the dungeons of the Tower of London have been requisitioned to store the surplus metal.

**SIMPLE EXPLANATION**

TORONTO, Feb. 21.—"One man forgot," says the Globe, in a news article this morning, with reference to the disaster at the gas plant here on Feb. 8, "when ten men were killed by escaping gas; this is the simple, though terrible explanation of the disaster."

Four men were removing a flange at the head end of a gas main to connect it up with a new device for regulating the flow of gas, according to the Globe. A few feet behind this flange the gas main forks into two branches, with a valve on each branch. The order had been given to close each of these two valves, but one man forgot to turn off the valve on one of the forks.
