### High Speed Cuts Gasoline, Oil And Tire Mileage

#### INTERESTING FACTS CONTAINED IN ROAD TEST RECORD BOOK

A good deal has been written about the danger of driving a motor car at high speeds but little publicity has been given to the actual dollars and cents waste in gasoline, oil and tires caused by high speed driving. Interesting facts on this subject are being learned by participants in the Imperial Oil Road Test now in progress all over Canada.

In the Official Record Book used by Test Car drivers the effect of speed on gasoline mileage is shown in chart form. By actual test, "Car A" was able to travel 220 miles on 10 gallons of gasoline at 25 miles per hour, but travelled only 175 miles when the speed was raised to 50 m.p.h.

"Car B," of different make, went only 99 miles on 10 gallons of gasoline at 25 m.p.h. At 50 m.p.h. the distance travelled fell to 88 miles.

A similar increase in oil consumption and tire wear at high speeds is shown. On a trip from city "A" to city "B" when the test car was driven very fast for one hour nearly 1-2 quarts of oil were consumed, compared with approximately 1-2 quart consumption for more than four hours driving at speed of 35 m.p.h. or less. The mileage was 80 per cent less at 50 m.p.h. than at 30 m.p.h.
