### AUTO DAYS

Sir:—In view of the fact that about all of our country roads are now open to auto traffic many of our people who use horses say that "in consequence of the daily auto traffic they are prevented from making use of the highways as they formerly did." And, as many of our people have asked me to assist in bringing about a remedy for their grievances I have therefore consented to do what I can.

In doing so I wish to be fair, but I must say that the feeling against continuous auto driving in many country districts is very pronounced. I would therefore impress on the auto association the need of using every effort to bring about a compromise with a view finding a remedy.

Being thoroughly conversant with country life conditions, permit me to say that I deem it in the interest of all concerned that the country roads should be closed to autos for two days in each week. Many of our farmers are short-handed this season. Now our girls and young lads can help in the greater production movement. They can very well drive to the village market or do many of the necessary errands and thus save the man's time on the land. The ladies say "give us two days in the week clear of the autos; we want to go to market; we want to drive to see our friends with out being in danger of having our horses frightened while on the way."

Now, Sir, I am fully aware that the great majority of auto owners are very careful and exceedingly accommodating when meeting timid horses on the road. Yet, nevertheless, many of our older people are not sufficiently courageous to take the risks and are staying at home in consequence; but there are certain conditions when intervention is necessary, and I feel that no person wishes to make use of pressure.

I only hope that the friendly relations existing between all parties may be broadened sufficiently so as to admit of all enjoying their various privileges and that each may be willing to allow to others their full enjoyment of life in all matters lawful and right.

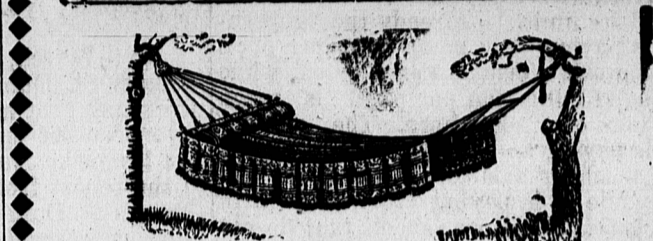
