THE SWANSEA TRADER.—The Furness West coast steamer, Swansea Trader, which for over a year has been engaged in a service between this island and Halifax has been withdrawn from this route and will in future be used on the English coast. She left for Liverpool with a large cargo last week. The Swansea Trader is in command of Capt. Gagnon, with C. G. Brenkman as first officer and H. Cliffe as chief engineer.

ALTERATIONS.—Extensive alterations and changes are taking place in the executive offices of the Fur Farmers' Bureau & Exchange, Ltd., Victoria Row, Charlottetown, in order to make room for their constantly enlarging staff. Additional offices have been secured in the second floor of the Morris Block, which is leased by this organization. They had been attending the funeral of the daughter of Mr. Jas. Affleck, Donaldson, and came to Tracadie station with the intention of returning to Mt. Stewart on the 4 o'clock train from Charlottetown, but the train being cancelled they all decided to face the elements on foot from Tracadie to Mt. Stewart, a distance of five miles. Such an arduous and perilous feat accomplished, among others, by a clergyman of mature years and a woman of not too robust constitution has not been equalled in this section of country since the pioneer days when people accepted hardship as their lot. The party reached Mt. Stewart between eight and nine o'clock very much fatigued of course, but as yet none the worse for their exposure.—L.
