U. S., Russia To Battle Over Jap Reparations

WASHINGTON, April 4 — (AP) — The United States moved today toward a battle with Russia over the division of Japanese reparations, with all signs pointing to a fight as bitter as the one going on at the Moscow conference regarding war damages from Germany.

At stake are about 1,000 Japanese industrial plants earmarked for shipment to various countries in payment for damage during the war. Over Russian objections, the United States intends to send about 300 of them immediately to China, the Philippines and Eastern possessions of the Netherlands and Great Britain.

One of the issues is Russia's contention that \$2,000,000,000 in Manchurian war plants already removed

THE KIRK PULPIT

Preaching yesterday morning on the theme "The Resurrection and the Life," the Minister, the Rev. T. H. Russell Somers, said: "To say, 'You shall never die, is not the way in which immortality is usually referred to. As the matter commonly stands in man's imagination, death is unescapable. Man is mortal and we all shall die—so runs the tale—and the question is, After death has thus done its ruinous work, can we hope for restoration to life again? Go through this congregation even on Easter Morning and note how many of us so put the question, postponing eternal life until after death. That however, is not the New Testament's way of conceiving the matter. Here and now, it says, we are in the presence of the eternal. Here and now we can enter into and experience the world invisible, intangible, imperishable. Here and now we need not be merely fugitive and transitory creatures but can have within ourselves eternal life. For that there is no death; in the story of that, what we call death is only an incident; that never dies. Deep and difficult though it is for our earth-bound imagination to conceive, if we can make that real to ourselves today, this will be an Easter Morning."

Games and other social activities concluded a successful and happy evening. Mr. Dingwell was born at Charlottetown, P. E. I. in 1885, a son of the late Mr. O.H. He started his railroad career on the former Prince Edward Island Railway which was then of the narrow gauge, with link and pin couplings and using only hand brakes; the Island railway has long since been modernized, and is now part of the National Prospects on the P.E.I. He was promoted to conductor in 1912 in which capacity he has since served, with the exception of that short world war one, he acted as yardmaster at different terminals on the Omega district.

Since coming to the Sault in 1939, he has been the local representative on the gentlemen's committee for the gentlemen, and also their safety first representative.

He emphasized the fact that the cooperation existing between the Canadian Pacific and its employees made his tasks very easy.

To those who feel they have failed there can come new hope, life can be made what God destined it to be. Easter can mean a new beginning of relationship in this world which can bring about the establishment everywhere of the Kingdom of God.

"The Christian people of our Church have to wake to the responsibilities which are theirs through the resurrection of Jesus Christ.
