Norma Shearer and Robert Taylor
held their audience spellbound with
their marvelous performance of
"Escape", Ethel Vance best seller
novel which was shown at the Cap-

With Miss Shearer as the Coun-
tess von Treck, world-weary head of
a Continental finishing school, and
Robert Taylor as young American
artist Mark Preysing, desperately
seeking word of his mother, ex-act-
ress Emmy Ritter, doomed to ex-
ecution in a concentration camp,
"Escape" becomes one of the most
gripping romantic-adventure stories
ever brought to the screen. Both
stars achieve new peaks of perfor-
mance.

The nine who complete the mem-
orable featured cast are Conrad
Veidt as the General, lover of the
Countess; Nazimova, star of silent
films, carving a new niche for her-
self as Emmy Ritter; Felix Bressart
as the old family retainer, Fritz;
Albert and Elsa Bassermann as the
crushed attorney and his wife; Phil-
ip Dorn as the concentration camp
physician, Dr. Diltzen; Edgar Bar-
rier as the sadistic Police Commis-
sioner; Bonita Granville as the
schoolgirl, Ursula; and Blanche
Yurka as the brutal prison nurse.

The tensely gripping quality of
the novel has been retained in full
in the screen play by Arch Oboler
and Marguerite Roberts, while Mer-
wyn LeRoy's direction provides an
authentically convincing entertain-
ment thrill.

planes of all types and damaging
of others in assaults yesterday and
the night before on German Air
Force positions, as well as in air
fighting. The R. A. F. losses were
nil.

The Nazi sky troop base at Male-
mi airfields and adjacent fields
where big transports and gliders
have been landing with troops
ferried from the Greek mainland
were the principal targets.

The R.A.F. also made a "large
number of sorties" yesterday in
Iraq, bombing the airfield at Mos-
ul and bombing and machine-gun-
ning German planes grounded at
Baquba, the communiqué said.

Informed British sources said
British marines had joined the
Crete defenders, but whether this
meant strong reinforcements by
sea could not be confirmed.

S'side to have Thermometer

Summerside citizens will have a constant reminder of the amount of support they give to the drive to raise six hundred million dollars for Canada's supreme war effort. Dominating the whole town will be a giant neon thermometer, mounted on one of the tallest buildings, which will beam forth the good news of the local contributions climb nearer to the objective.

Though electricity rather than mercury will flow through the veins of this magnificent gauge it will be an accurate register of the fervor with which Summerside backs the fight for freedom and the survival of democracy.

Officials of the local committee, entrusted with publicity for the fast approaching Victory Loan campaign say that this is but one of the many impressive spectacles planned to keep the attention of the public focused on the grave responsibility that it must shoulder.

The super-thermometer will tower to a height of 16 feet. Having a width of over 4 feet it will be visible at a great distance. The climbing neon shaft will be red in color. It will be set in blue with a white background. It's face will be gauged not to record heat, but Victory Bond sales.

As John Citizen digs in to lend to his government in its time of need, and as he thrills to see the neon shaft shoot a point higher, he will have swelled the little more the vast potential that is eventually going to free the world.

attempts at vertical envelopment, had won on Crete.

Neither official nor unofficial British sources would say if Nazi plane-carried tanks had yet gone into action, but the latter were the source of the report that Germany had landed them there.

The amazing struggle already has been high-lighted by the downward swarming of parachute and glider-carried shock troops intended to overcome the defenders by sheer force of numbers.

The plane-borne tank, so far as authentic information goes, had been largely a matter of speculation among the military men, although there were reports that the Russians used them in their 1940 occupation of Bessarabia.

The only problem had been to build such a vehicle sufficiently armored but light enough to be carried by air—either in a special under-carriage rack or actually within the body of a transport.

British authorities whose naval forces destroyed or routed all but a few sea-borne German landing parties had counted on sea mastery to keep from the invaders of Crete all but the lightest sort of artillery.

British success along this line may actually have forced the Germans to pull the Pegasus tanks out of their bag of military tricks. (British officials made no comment on German claims to have sunk in the Mediterranean 11 British cruisers, eight destroyers, one submarine and five torpedo boats. Previously naval spokesmen had cautioned the public to expect losses but had indicated German claims then were grossly exaggerated.)

With the dwindling of the guerilla warfare between the British and the pro-axis forces of Iraq — if not an actual debacle for the two-month-old government of Rashid Ali Al Gailani—the whole military situation of the Middle East pivoted on the battle of Crete.

The Crete campaign was reported to have brought a complete stoppage to the trickle of planes and supplies Germany had been sending into Iraq by way of French-mandated Syria, but optimistic Germans at Ankara, Turkey, predicted occupation of the island by Wednesday, and said help to Iraq would be renewed.

The official canvassers for Summerside and vicinity will be supported in their work by a group of assistants who have not yet been named.

The Victory Loan workers for the town will be shown a special picture at the Capitol Theatre in the course of their meeting to receive campaign instructions. Later they will be given a banquet.
