Synopsis of Canadian North West Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any Agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land, each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a tract of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister, intending homesteader.

Pre-emption.—A homesteader who has exhausted his home stead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$100 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$1000.

Synopsis of Canadian North West Land Regulations.


