Japan May Make Representations

(Canadian Press) OKYO, Jan. 25.—Japan may ask the Canadian government to take steps in connection with the attempt made by two Canadians last week to blow up the 11,921-ton Japanese steamship Hye Maru at Seattle, it was learned here. The incident, which led to the death of Rophie Forsyth, Vancouver school teacher, one of the two men involved and resulted in no damage to the ship, was discussed at the Foreign Office yesterday by Eugene H. Dopman, ambassador of the United States.

Dr. J. S. Bonnell Begins Princeton Lectureship

(New York World-Telegram Jan 22) Dr. John S. Bonnell minister of the Fifth Ave. Presbyterian Church at Fifth Ave. 55th St., will begin his new duty as visiting lecturer of pastoral theology at Princeton Seminary next Tuesday. These lectures will be delivered weekly throughout the second semester. The establishment of this course, which is compulsory for the members of the graduating class, is an evidence of a new trend in the training of theological students. Much more stress than formerly is being placed upon the minister's relationship to individuals.

In the seventeenth lectures on "The Cure of Souls" Dr. Bonnell will deal with pastoral and sick visitation, the solving of the individual's personal problems, the impact of the Christian Gospel upon the parishioners' inner needs and the use of psychiatric methods in personal interviews. The lecturer has had an unusual training, for a minister, in various types of personal disorders.

For many years he was closely associated with a large mental hospital in Canada, where his father was supervisor for forty-six years. Dr. Bonnell took a two-year course of training at this institution and had intimate contact with all phases of mental and nervous disorders. Throughout his ministry he has specialized in personal interviews and has been consulted by thousands of people in the course of this ministry.

In his course at Princeton he will deal especially with the very large contribution that Christian faith makes to mental and physical well-being. Dr. Bonnell holds that ministers should not strive to be third or fourth-class psychiatrists but that they should be conversant with the findings of the new sciences of the mind in order to be more efficient in dealing with individuals.

The minister's main contribution, Dr. Bonnell holds, will lie in his awakening or developing the individual's religious faith. The Christian pastor, he believes, has a ministry that goes beyond that of the psychiatrist or practicing psychologist.

He believes that every Christian minister ought to set apart a time in every week when his parishioners may meet him in personal consultation. A tremendous service would be rendered by ministers if they did nothing more than listen patiently while a surcharged heart empties itself of a heavy burden. When people realize that every confidence entrusted to them is kept inviolate, young and old will come to the minister with their problems.

Developing this idea he has established a School of Religion which he will direct each Wednesday evening in the chapel of his church. The first lecture was given last Wednesday evening. This course of instruction includes such subjects as "What is Religion?" "What is Revelation?" "How Should the Bible Be Read?" "How Shall We Pray?" An opportunity will be given for the presentation of written questions to the speaker. The sessions of the school are open to the general public.
