CHURCH OF SCOTLAND PULPIT

Rev. Horace F. MacEwen continued his series on the Epistle to the Romans. The first chapter to the eighteenth verse deals with the power of God to salvation revealed in the gospel, promised before Christ came, now given in Him. This is realized through faith for salvation, according to the Old Testament verse, "The just shall live by his faith". The next step in the Epistle is to demonstrate man's need for this revealed truth and the Apostle accordingly witnesses that creation and law testify against both gentile and Jew.

Man originally had the knowledge of God directly, but he did not choose to retain it. "When they knew God, they glorified him not as God, neither were thankful; but became vain in their imaginations, and their foolish heart was darkened." The natural man, in his own wisdom, has no use nor desire to follow God and His revealed truth. He will form objects of worship to suit his own fancies and lusts, hence the reason for false religions and religious systems. He had changed "the glory of the uncorruptible God into an image of his own desiring, whether it be a literal one or an ideological one. The result of this apostasy is that "God also gave them up to uncleanness" and "up to vile affections", with the heart filled with "all unrighteousness, evil, wickedness, covetousness maliciousness".

In the day of judgment the secrets of men's hearts will be revealed. Those who judge others for sin should first judge themselves, because they are without excuse. Not a mere knowledge of sin is necessary, but a consistent righteousness is required. "Thou art inexcusable, O man, who soever thou art that judgest; for wherein thou judgest another; thou condemnest thyself; for thou that judgest doest the same things". It is essential that we see ourselves in the light of God's absolute holiness and judge our condition in that light. Conviction of sin is the preliminary to the need of salvation. Sin must first be judged in the heart. A person who has not been born again is in no position to judge anyone else. There is no respect of persons with God and He will judge everyone on the basis of privilege. The Jews will be judged according to the law, because that was their special privilege. The gentiles apart from it, because they have consciences which "accuse or else excuse one another." The world is hastening on to the judgment, and there is only one shelter against the day of wrath—that is the precious blood of the Son of God. "For as many as have sinned without law shall also perish without law; and as many as have sinned in the law shall be judged by the law."

THE KIRK PULPIT

Preaching last night on the subject, "When Faith Faces Frustration", the Minister, the Rev. T.H.E. Somers, said: There is a very natural inclination on the part of those not at the moment caught in the full fury of the storm, not compelled to fight to hold on to their faith, to expect their friends who are so caught, consistently to display courage, confidence and unwavering faith. That was not possible even for our Lord; how shall we expect it of ourselves and our friends? When we see our friends wavering under the blast of circumstances, when they are not their best, when they do things that make us just a little ashamed of them, when they say things that make us cringe—that, of all times, is the time to stand by them, until, supported by our love and faith, they reassemble their scattered resources, regain their courage, and return to the fight. One of the modern translations of the book of Job contains this tribute to that heroic figure, offered him by his friends just when he was in the depths of despair—"they said to him, 'Your words have kept man on their feet.' That would be a heartening word to receive at any time, but in the moment of despair it would turn the tide from defeat to victory! Words of that sort are the privilege and the obligation of friendship to those who are engaged in fighting the good fight to keep their faith, to finish their course, not in spite of, but because of the power gained from the struggle with the frustrating circumstances that confront them.

Said Goethe:
 "Who never ate with tears his bread,
 Who never, through the troubled hours
 Weeping sat upon his bed,
 He knows not, ye heavenly powers"

The Christian faith does not guarantee to explain why, on occasion, we are thrust into such dire circumstances, but the Christian faith does guarantee that, by the Grace of God, those who put their trust in Him, can bring something creative out of whatever plight they confront, can create goodness out of evil, can bring victory out of defeat. Those who are hesitant to trust the validity of that guarantee are asked to look at just one thing, that Cross, which for all time, portrays the final proof that when we link ourselves with God there are no dead-end streets!

CHURCH OF SCOTLAND PULPIT

Rev. Horace F. MacEwen continued his series on the Epistle to the Romans. The first chapter to the eighteenth verse deals with the power of God to salvation revealed in the gospel, promised before Christ came, now given in Him. This is realized through faith for salvation, according to the Old Testament verse, "The just shall live by his faith". The next step in the Epistle is to demonstrate man's need for this revealed truth and the Apostle accordingly witnesses that creation and law testify against both gentile and Jew.

Man originally had the knowledge of God directly, but he did not choose to retain it. "When they knew God, they glorified him not as God, neither were thankful; but became vain in their imaginations, and their foolish heart was darkened." The natural man, in his own wisdom, has no use nor desire to follow God and His revealed truth. He will form objects of worship to suit his own fancies and lusts, hence the reason for false religions and religious systems. He had changed "the glory of the uncorruptible God into an image of his own desiring, whether it be a literal one or an ideological one. The result of this apostasy is that "God also gave them up to uncleanness" and "up to vile affections", with the heart filled with "all unrighteousness, evil, wickedness, covetousness maliciousness".

In the day of judgment the secrets of men's hearts will be revealed. Those who judge others for sin should first judge themselves, because they are without excuse. Not a mere knowledge of sin is necessary, but a consistent righteousness is required. "Thou art inexcusable, O man, who soever thou art that judgest; for wherein thou judgest another; thou condemnest thyself; for thou that judgest doest the same things". It is essential that we see ourselves in the light of God's absolute holiness and judge our condition in that light. Conviction of sin is the preliminary to the need of salvation. Sin must first be judged in the heart. A person who has not been born again is in no position to judge anyone else. There is no respect of persons with God and He will judge everyone on the basis of privilege. The Jews will be judged according to the law, because that was their special privilege. The gentiles apart from it, because they have consciences which "accuse or else excuse one another." The world is hastening on to the judgment, and there is only one shelter against the day of wrath—that is the precious blood of the Son of God. "For as many as have sinned without law shall also perish without law; and as many as have sinned in the law shall be judged by the law."

THE KIRK PULPIT

Preaching last night on the subject, "When Faith Faces Frustration", the Minister, the Rev. T.H.E. Somers, said: There is a very natural inclination on the part of those not at the moment caught in the full fury of the storm, not compelled to fight to hold on to their faith, to expect their friends who are so caught, consistently to display courage, confidence and unwavering faith. That was not possible even for our Lord; how shall we expect it of ourselves and our friends? When we see our friends wavering under the blast of circumstances, when they are not their best, when they do things that make us just a little ashamed of them, when they say things that make us cringe—that, of all times, is the time to stand by them, until, supported by our love and faith, they reassemble their scattered resources, regain their courage, and return to the fight.
