DAILY RECIPE

Frozen Fruit Roll
1 cup sugar.
1/2 cup boiling milk.
1 cup sugar.
1 teaspoon orange extract.
2 1/2 cups thick cream.
Sub-Mild seed raisins.
(Soaked in cider for 12 hours.)
Mix the well beaten egg yolks with the milk, sugar and orange extract. Stir until thick and add the thick cream, cool and freeze. Line the bottom of an ice cream mould with the raisins, cover with frozen cream and fill the mould with alternate layers of cream and raisins. Cover mould tightly and pack in salt and ice for three hours. In serving cut the roll in slices and pour over the following hot sauce:
2 squares unsweetened chocolate.
2 cups light brown sugar.
2 tablespoons butter.
1/2 cup rich milk.
1 1/2 teaspoon lemon extract.
1/2 teaspoon vanilla.
Melt the chocolate in a buttered saucepan set in hot water. Add the brown sugar, mix well and add the butter and milk. Cook until it forms a soft ball when a little is dropped in cold water. Flavor with lemon and vanilla extracts. This will harden when poured over the frozen fruit roll.

Wesley College Professor at Winnipeg Dismissed

WINNIPEG, July 6.—Professor W. G. Smith, of the philosophy and sociological departments of Wesley College, has been dismissed by a majority vote of the board of directors of the college on the grounds of insubordination. The professor announced today that he intends to fight the charge preferred against him as an "unmitigated falsehood." Action by the board follows a dispute of long standing between Professor Smith and President J. H. Riddell, which resulted in an open breach of the Methodist conference held recently in Winnipeg, when the professor, told the delegates that moral conditions among students at the college were not what they should be.
