1 1/2 tablespoon minute tapioca, or 3/4 cup pearl tapioca. 2 cups scalded milk. 2 eggs. 1-3 cup sugar. 1/4 tablespoon salt. 1 tablespoon vanilla. Pick over tapioca and soak 1 hour in cold water to cover. Drain, add to milk and cook in a double boiler until tapioca is transparent.

If according to your best judgment you can't vote for me, vote against me. I would rather be defeated by voters willing to fulfill the highest duty of citizenship than by the stay away conduct of laggards who have not yet learned to place a real value on the high privilege of the franchise.
