Survey of Nursing Power of Canada

A nation-wide survey to determine the nurse-power in Canada, where it is, what it is, and the best use that can be made of it for the duration of the war is being made under the auspices of the Canadian Medical Procurement and Assignment Board, it was announced today.

The Canadian Nurses Association, as one of the groups primarily concerned with the health of the nation, is taking an active part and is lending every possible assistance in the survey which will extend into every province and cover all health fields.

At the same time National Selective Service has announced that a registration of all graduate nurses, active and inactive, married and single, will be carried out on March 17, 18 and 19.

The findings of the survey will be correlated with the findings of National Selective Service.

Since the outbreak of the war, investigations and studies have been carried out on a more limited scale. The present survey is a much more comprehensive one. It has been described by the Minister of National Defence as "a project of the utmost importance in the prosecution of the War."

The analysis of the findings of the survey will undoubtedly assist in solving some of the problems that are experienced now in all fields in which nurses are employed. It will also make possible the formulation of more comprehensive plans to meet both the military and civilian needs and to ensure an adequate supply of nurses to meet emergency needs.

The latest figures made available show that there are approximately 22,620 registered nurses in Canada, and a total of 11,400 nurses in training.

Social Security Report To Be Released Tuesday

OTTAWA, March 11 — (CP) — A 125-page report on social security, covering basically the same ground for Canada as William Beveridge covered in his widely-publicized report on social insurance for the United Kingdom, will be made public next Tuesday.

The announcement was made by Dr. Cyril James, principal of McGill University and chairman of an advisory committee on reconstruction which was set up by the government early in the war.

Today the report was placed on the record of the House of Commons committee on reconstruction and re-establishment. On Tuesday it will be presented also to the reconstruction committee on social security at its first meeting and then will become public property.

The report was prepared by Dr. I. C. Marsh, Technical Advisor to Dr. James' committee.

Dr. James told members of the reconstruction committee today that there is growing recognition in Canada that the challenge offered by problems of reconstruction is equal to that of wartime mobilization in 1940-41.

Social security, Dr. James said, is the negative part of reconstruction and is dependent on national income. The committee was concentrating on "maximizing" the national income. Development of long-range post-war programs by private interests was being encouraged.

The Social Security Minister Mackenzie who addressed the committee, urged the appointment of citizen groups in all Canadian communities to aid in re-establishing discharged members of the forces.

Officers of his department were experiencing some difficulty in getting young men who were discharged with no lack of training or experience in a trade to take advantage of the vocational training available for them, he said.

The welfare policy by provinces and municipalities is being studied in connection with employment to ex-service men was also urged by the minister.

Extend Rationing In U.S. April 1

WASHINGTON, March 11 — (AP) — Agriculture Secretary Claude Wickard tonight ordered rationing of meat, butter, and other edible fats and oils, cheese and canned fish "on or before April 1" and estimated that the meat ration will be in the neighborhood of two pounds, more or less, a week.

(Butter, at 5-13 ounces per person per week, coffee and sugar are the only food products rationed in Canada. Food products rationed at present in the United States include sugar, coffee and a long list of processed foods.)

This does not include meat eaten in restaurants where ration coupons will not be necessary.

Cheese will be in addition to the meat ration, contrary to reports current about a week ago that persons would have to use part of their meat coupons to get cheese.

Wickard announced he has authorized the Federal Price Administration to proceed with the rationing and O.P.A. will make public most of the details tomorrow.

Consider Farm Call-Up Exemptions

OTTAWA, March 11 — (CP) — All cases of call-up exemptions for farm workers which are brought to the attention of his Department will be dealt with "more carefully," Labor Minister Mitchell said today in the House of Commons.

He was answering an inquiry by O.H. Castleden (C.C.F. Yorkton) as to whether the government knew that many men engaged in agriculture in Saskatchewan were being called to compulsory military service and whether steps were being taken to see that the government's intentions on farm labor were observed.

Mr. Mitchell said that where necessary, applications for postponement of compulsory military service to meet mobilization (Prog. Com. No. 2) Diefenbaker (Prog. Com. No. 1) Lake Centre asked whether the government had considered appointment of high court judges to sit on the boards so there would be uniformity in decisions on postponement applications throughout the country.

Mr. Mitchell replied: "No."

Mr. B. Hanson (Prog. Com. York Sunbury) said there is a "continuing recurrence" of call-ups of men who have a ready enlisted voluntariness.

"Nobody regrets more than I do that sometimes occurrences such as my honorable friend has referred to," Mr. Mitchell replied. "The situation was a considerable one, mechanics and organization and every step was being taken to see that there was no recurrence."

Dec. Employment At High Level

OTTAWA, March 10 — (CP) — A reduction of 1-2 per cent in employment at Jan. 1, as compared with Dec. 1 was the smallest contraction during December shown in the Dominion Bureau of Statistics which today reported that the unemployment rate was 13.4 per cent.

The 13.4 per cent establishments furnishing information to the Bureau reported a personnel of 1,830,544 on Jan. 1, a reduction of 28,000 compared with the Dec. 1 figure of 1,858,544.

The prolonged holiday season at Christmas and the New Year, which the holidays fell on Friday, was said by the Bureau to be an important factor in a considerable decline recorded in weekly payrolls.

These aggregated \$51,340,119, a reduction of about 2 per cent from the Dec. 1 figure of \$52,147,178. The per capita weekly average fell from \$30.06 to \$27.91. The average at the same date last year was \$26.13.
