TRANSFER OF STEAMERS
YARMOUTH, August 6.—P. GILKIN, general manager of the Dominion Atlantic railway, arrived here from Kentville at noon on Monday, and during the afternoon attended to the transfer of the steamers Prince Arthur, Prince George and Boston, from his company to the Yarmouth and Boston steamship company, which was incorporated several months ago, and the head offices of which are in Montreal.
The new company appears to be linked up with the Eastern Steamship company, a corporation which operates lines of steamers between Boston, Maine ports and St. John. The head offices are in Boston, and the boats are managed by Calvin Austen.

SHIPS OR MONEY.
MONTREAL, August 6.—That Canada should make an annual contribution of either ships or money to the imperial authorities and that in return for this the Dominion should have representation in the British house of commons was the declaration this morning of H. Risley, a prominent citizen and a member of the chamber of commerce of Bristol, England, who is here to try to improve trade relations between this and the mother country.
Following an extended call which he made on Major G. W. Stephens, commissioners, Mr. Risley contended chairman of the board of harbor that the British nation should be as one nation—one and indivisible. He did not say that the overseas dominions should be administered from the other side of the water, but that each of the British possessions, having its own legislature or parliament, should closely identify itself with the needs and requirements of Britain.
Mr. Risley placed himself upon record as being strongly in favor of said "free trade," "I believe," he should exist between Great Britain and her overseas dominions."
Referring to the celebrations which are to take place in Halifax in connection with the discovery of the North American continent by Henry Cabot in 1497, Mr. Risley remarked that several fine gifts had been sent over to Halifax by Bristol and even Somerset people in commemoration of the event. One has taken the form of a bronze tablet suitably engraved. Another is a silk banner, a replica of that given by Henry VII to Cabot before the latter sailed on his voyage of discovery, while the
