Mrs. MacKenzie and Family: Great was our regret when the news went around that still another homestead was to be closed up, and that Mrs. MacKenzie and family were planning to move to another country, a country which has already been too extensively enriched by frequent infusions of the very life blood of this Island. Mrs. MacKenzie, you yourself, and your sons and daughters have carried on bravely and well, in the face of many difficulties, and each one as he or she grew up, cheerfully undertook to fill their place in the life of the community, and to be worthy sons and daughters of one, whose tragic death some years ago, left a blank in Hartsville which will not likely ever be filled, one who was a devoted and loving husband and father, one whose cheery smile and kindly word brought cheer to many a drooping heart, one who liberally and wholeheartedly supported the work of the Church, and did his best in every way possible to further the best interests of the district in which he lived. For these and other reasons the memory of John A. MacKenzie is enshrined in the hearts of all who knew him and it is a great regret to us that the family have decided to close the home and move abroad. We cannot allow you to leave our midst without in some small way expressing the esteem which we hold for you, and we ask you to accept this small gift, not for its monetary worth, but simply as a parting gift from your friends.
