The annual exchange of ministers of the Protestant churches in this city took place yesterday. The services in all churches were unusually well attended; both morning and evening.

Word was received in this city late on Saturday evening by Mrs. Hogg of the death at Sherbrooke, Que., of little Gwyneth, the only and dearly loved child of Robert and Mrs. Hogg. It is only a few days since Mrs. Hogg left the little one in Sherbrooke, well and the picture of health; now she has been called away, and the sympathy of many friends will go out to the sorrowing parents and relatives in their sad and sudden bereavement.

The death occurred in this city on Saturday evening of Mrs. Catherine Griffith, Dorchester St., in the eighty eighth year of her age. The late Mrs. Griffith was the widow of Daniel Griffith, who some years ago manufactured soap and candles in a factory near the home where his widow died. Mr. Griffith was the second husband of the deceased and he died some fifteen or twenty years ago. She first married a Mr. Wright and was formerly the widow of West River and has a brother now residing in the city. Another of her sisters was the wife of a Mr. Byrne, formerly station agent at Georgetown and now located abroad. The funeral takes place this morning.

J. E. Lanthorne, City, was one of the most successful of the exhibitors at the recent P. E. I. Poultry show. He exhibited Leghorns, Minorcas, Fantails and Pigeons and carried off prizes in each class. His showing won the gold medal following prizes: Special American Poultry Association silver medal for best cockerel in the show, W. N. Farnon's beautiful silver cup for the best ten birds, five males and five females, any one variety, pure bred, owned three months or reared by exhibitor, to be won three years in succession. The Guardian for one year for best Brown Leghorn cockerel or pullet. In single comb brown Leghorns they won one first, two seconds and two thirds, and in black minorcas, one first and one second. In the Fantails and in Pigeons he won the first for white fantails. Mr. Lanthorne is an enthusiastic poultry man and his knowledge of proper breeding and the care of fowl has always resulted in a large measure of success wherever they are shown.

NEW YORK, Jan. 7.—The movements in the cotton market today have not been significant. The real item of news of the market is the weekly statistical position as shown by the chronicle in today's issue, and the figures form a sufficiently strong comment in themselves. To those figures I desire to call your particular attention. The worlds visible supply this week as compared with last year shows an increase of 360,000 bales of which American shows an increase of 433,000 bales. The crop in sight shows an increase over last year of a million bales and into sight for the week are 80,000 and the seasons exports show an increase of 720,000. In addition to this there are on ship not cleared 248,851 bales which is an increase over last year of 106,000. The port stocks are about 380,000. This is largely accounted for by the big stock here in New York amounting to 283,000 bales. It is expected that heavy shipments will shortly be made abroad from local stocks.

NEW YORK, Jan. 7.—Randolph says:—The announcement just at the opening of failure of the Carnation Trust Co., caused some moderate activity of stocks under which prices declined fractionally all through the list. There was excellent absorption however, and before the end of the first half hour, the entire list had begun to advance. Advancing movement kept up during the two hours of trading with activity increasing as prices rose and the highest prices in a rule were made. Amongst the usually active stocks Reading was easily the leader, rising nearly three points above its early low level but all of the Standards showed pronounced strength and the market had a tendency to broaden out the which would seem to indicate that the bull period is about over. Forecasts of the bank statement were favorable showing a considerable gain in cash at the local institution which promises to keep up for some time.

By resolution the matter of recommending rules and regulations for the inspection of aeroplanes and balloons and their equipment was referred to the Technical Committee, which is composed of John F. O'Rourke, chairman; S. Marsh Young, Hugh L. Willoughby, Edgar Meyer and Clifford E. Dunn. The committee was instructed to make a searching investigation of the equipment and the construction of the machines in which Messrs. Moisant and Hoxsey lost their lives.

**THE RAILROAD IS NOT RESPONSIBLE**

VICKSBURG, Jan. 5.—Because a railroad company furnishes a special train to a party of men and it is used to convey a mob bent on lynching, the railroad company cannot be held for damages. In effect, this decision was rendered yesterday by Judge J. H. Williams in the United States district court.

In the suit at issue, Mrs. Annie Rogers, whose husband was lynched at Tallulah, Louisiana, several years ago, sought the recovery of \$50,000 from the Vicksburg, Shreveport and Pacific railroad. In her petition, Mrs. Rogers held that the railroad company was liable for damages because they furnished a train which transported the mob from Monroe, Louisiana, to Tallulah.

Rogers was charged with killing Jesse Brown, a planter of Girard. Both men were prominent.

**HOLMER WILL VISIT HALIFAX**

HALIFAX, N. S., January 5.—Hans Holmer who won the marathon race in Manhattan Tuesday, will come to Halifax and spend several weeks before returning to New York. Holmer's time for the Powder Hill marathon is a new world's record.

The Frenchman, Boucard led for 15 miles in one hour 21 minutes and 15 seconds.
