JAIL GOVERNOR IS DISMISSED

SANDWICH, Ont., Nov. 16.—William Sparks, governor of the county jail here, has been notified by the sheriff of his removal from office. Sparks' dismissal is the direct result of suicide in jail of Chris Spindelman, who was awaiting examination for murdering his wife last July. Spindelman strangled himself in a cell with his shoe laces. The act was not discovered for three or four hours after death, though the guards were supposed to be on duty over the cell at the time. Mr. Sparks was appointed twenty years ago, after the murder of then governor Leach by escaping prisoners.

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—Edward M. Brooks an actor and Miss Dorothy M. Render an 18 year old school girl of Manchester, N. H., were married in the private chambers of District Attorney Jerome in the criminal courts building today.

Brooks was arrested here on Oct. 18 on a charge of abduction preferred by Miss Render's parents. It was alleged that the girl became infatuated with Brooks while he was playing in Manchester and that when he left the city she went with him. Brooks was arraigned today but he was not called upon to plead. His counsel said that the prisoner would be glad to marry the girl. A conference between counsel followed and an hour later, after the prisoner had been discharged, the marriage ceremony was performed.
