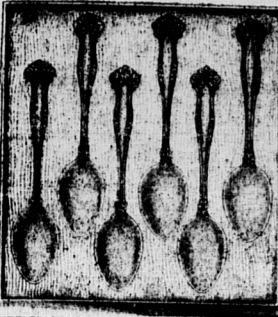

A meat contractor from New Glasgow, N. S. has been in this City for the last few days awaiting the arrival of the winter steamers at Georgetown. He declares that he would have effected large purchases of meat from the farmers with profits both to himself and to them, but that owing to the uncertainty of the movements of the boats he was obliged to abandon his intentions, thus affording another evidence of loss to the farmers for want of better means of communication with the mainland.

C. J. McMillan of Charlottetown, refereed the hockey game between St. Francis Xavier and Harvard last week. The game was a close one throughout, always being in doubt. The Crimson players had the lead on the Canadians a little in team play, but the visitors got back by their stick work and individual playing. Postponed from Saturday because of lack of ice, the game was played on poor ice in order that the Canadians would not have to return without a game. Both teams were out of practice, and so were pretty even on that score, but the poor ice was evidently an advantage to the Crimson team, as the Canadians were used to good ice continually. St. Francis Xavier started off with a rush and at the beginning had the Harvard players on the defensive for about 10 minutes, but tactics were soon reversed, and the Canadians were obliged to take the defensive shot at the net, and it was only by the cleverest work on the part of McDonald, that the shots were not made good. Finally the Crimson players got together in a well organized attack, and swept down the rink like a whirlwind, got past the cover point and point, and on a clever pass from Hornblower, Hicks caged the puck for the only tally of the game. In the second half the St. Francis players came back with a rush, and played as if they meant business. The playing was largely into the second half, when they once more got together, and except for the minute that Hicks was obliged to go to the side lines, the Harvard team had the visitors at their mercy until the end the Canadians made one last effort, but Harvard's defence was too good for them, and they were obliged to go away defeated.

The following is taken from the Revelstoke, B. C. Herald of Jan. 20th. The inquest on the bodies of the late Engineer W. Coughlin and Fireman E. A. Hawkins, who were killed at Three Valley last week when the engine struck a slide, is being pinned in the locomotive engine room place on Monday before coroner's court. From the evidence it appears that the watchman who patrolled that section of the track where the accident happened, had made his customary inspection which was carefully inspected about a quarter of an hour before each train was due, a list of trains being sent out to the watchman every morning and evening. The train was, however, put back about an hour and this fact being apparently unknown to the watchman who made his rounds according to schedule, and went into his job as usual. Between this time and the arrival of the late train the slides came down and the accident occurred. The jury brought in the following verdict: "We, the jury impanelled to inquire into the death of W. Coughlin, engineer, and E. A. Hawkins, fireman, find that they met their death by accident, by the engine striking a snow slide and plunging the truck, plunging into the Three Valley Lake and being drowned; and in our opinion "That watchman should be compelled to call up the dispatcher and find out about delayed trains, in order that they patrol the track immediately preceding arrival of train." The body of the late Fireman Hawkins, who was killed last week at Three Valley with Engineer Coughlin in the C. P. R. train wreck, was shipped to Murray Harbor, Prince Edward Island. The local order of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers took charge of the funeral arrangements. The Provincialist who sent the above clipping says that Mr. Hawkins was of a quiet nature, a studious and ambitious young man and the position he held will be a great loss for him, for none out such a man can get it under C. P. R. rules. The Guardian deeply sympathizes with the relatives and friends.
