French Capital Levy Bill Introduced

PARIS, April 7.—The government's new financial bill embodying provisions for the proposed capital levy or forced loan was introduced in the Chamber of Deputies this afternoon by Finance Minister De Monzie.

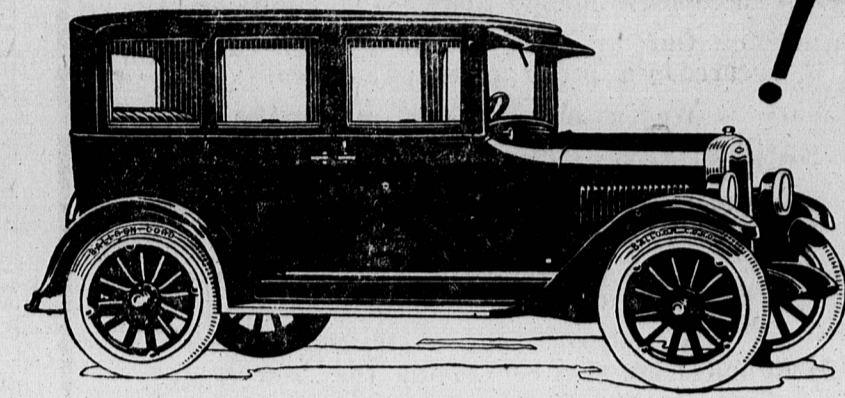
The mechanism of the system as explained by the Finance Minister after adjournment of this morning's cabinet meeting is intended to afford property owners and capitalists of France a chance to come forward and contribute proportionately of their wealth in the renovation of French finances.

It contains provisions obliging them to do so if they refrain from voluntary subscription. The minister gave it to be understood that pressure would be restored to only in flagrant cases of "dodging" by a capitalist of his obligations.
