THE LATE MR. GUY CAMERON
 His many friends will regret to hear of the death of Mr. Guy Cameron of the Royal Bank of Canada, which occurred on July 3rd, in Lima, Peru.

Jury Find MacKinnon Guilty

caused at the place of contact; the clips, and an cause the inner tube to blow. The break in the fabric would be caused by impact with a hard substance.

Witness demonstrated the relative positions of the blow out in the inner tube, the break in the casing showing that if the tire were assembled and placed in position on the rim, they would coincide.

Constable Trainor then proceeded to demonstrate the way in which the clip or strap and fender brace fitted on the fender, pointing out how the rubber plates on each where contact had worn off the enamel and exposed the metal both on the fender and the clip, coincided.

Witness testified that, previous to entering the police force, he had conducted a tire vulcanizing business on Queen Street for three or four years. He had also taken a course in motor mechanics at the technical school in 1919 and 1920. He identified the license plate and described the car, giving the serial number.

The witness was cross examined by Mr. Johnston, at whose request, he again described the way in which the tire, tube and rim fitted, and the co-incidence of the scratches, fabric break and blow out. Witness expressed himself as quite satisfied that the scratches on the rim were made by worn off the concrete. Questioned concerning the fender cross brace, witness mentioned having seen such an arrangement on the car of the accused previously.

Constable Watson Higgins—(sworn) examined by Mr. Campbell, deposed that he knew the prisoner, car, prior to the 13th of May. He noticed a fender brace on it similar to that produced in court. He testified to the intoxicated condition of Clinton and MacKinnon in the cells at the police station on the day of the accident. Clinton was noisy, and MacKinnon was lying down as if dozed.

Witness told of making an examination of the car of the accused in the Charlottetown Garage at three o'clock in the afternoon of that day. He took the rod and fender clip along with him, and on fitting the latter to the car found it corresponded with the fender in the way described.

He described the car and the damage to it, his evidence in this regard co-inciding generally with that given by the previous witnesses. He noticed that five of the spokes in the left hind wheel were broken at the hub. He also noticed marks on the perch as if caused by an impact, and a dark stain on the axle about two inches left of the left front perch. This he considered to be blood. He then sent for Dr. Scanlon, who took two impressions, and on examination, found the substance to be blood.

Cross examined by Mr. Johnston. There is a difference between the fenders of a Ford and a Chevrolet. There is a difference in the grooves that are rolled out in the fenders. They do not fit the right fender as well as the left. Witness did not try the brace on any other Ford car, and could not say whether it would fit such a car or not.

This closed the case for the Crown.

The defence called no evidence. Mr. Saunders then addressed the jury summing up the principal points which had been brought out in the evidence. He began by contrasting the behaviour of the deceased victim of the accident on that Sunday morning with the behaviour of the accused. Had the accused only been at a church service that Sunday morning like the deceased, he felt the jurymen would not have been here today to deal with this sad affair.

He congratulated the Chief of Police for the city on his diligence in producing evidence, namely all the witnesses having been brought forward with his assistance.

The Attorney General then proceeded to comment on the heartless character of the man—Mr. Stewart—who had run Mr. Simmons' car, and then proceeded as quickly as he could without stopping to help the victim, or to see how badly he was injured.

He went on to trace the progress of the car from the time it was seen going down Queen Street by Henry Joyce at ten minutes to twelve on Sunday to its appearance at about 1.30 p. m. at Ralph Jenkin's service station, as revealed by the evidence of the witnesses, according to the Crown's theory of the case.

(The Court took recess till 2.30 p. m.)

AFTERNOON SESSION
 At the afternoon session, Mr. Saunders continued his address to the jury, drawing their attention to the blood which had been found on the car, the fender brace which had been found at the scene of the accident and which seemed to belong to it, the nature of the car which struck the man (a Ford Tudor Sedan), and the dress of the driver, (gray coat and light cap.)

These things demand an explanation. If Counsel for the prisoner at the bar can give a better explanation, then it is your duty to give it to the benefit of the accused. But to my mind they are unexplainable.

One of the most dastardly deeds ever committed in the history of the province was committed by the driver of that car on that Sunday when he knocked down a God-fearing and respected citizen, and then drove off as fast as he could and left him to his fate. And if you find from the evidence that the prisoner at the bar was the driver of that car, then I feel sure that no appeals to your sympathy on the part of his counsel will move you from doing your duty.

stancial evidence could often lead Justice astray—especially in matters of identification.

"Is the evidence before you sufficient," he said, "to identify this car and shut out other cars? There was a spot of blood on the car. But there was no evidence given as to its age, and the doctor who examined it was unable to say even whether it was human or animal blood.

Many of us run over animals on the road in a perfectly innocent way when driving cars, and, if conviction were to depend on blood stains, we might some of us find ourselves in a dangerous position.

Adverting to the exhibits, Mr. Stewart said, "Surely you are not going to condemn a man for manslaughter because a rusted piece of iron co-incides with a rust spot on another. There are many details of this sort, but they are very far from positive identification, and in the aggregate, they amount to even less than that."

The speaker then went on to deal with the question of the identity of the prisoner as driver of the car, pointing out discrepancies of the clothing of the accused and the clothing of the driver, as well as the fact that the accused was wearing a hat which was not on the car at the time of the accident.

Mr. Stewart then pointed out, with regard to Mr. Stewart's conviction about the tire coming off the car at the point of the accident with the consequent tracks made by the rim, that such in his belief was not the case. The deflated tire, he believed remained on the rim, till the car reached the C. A. A. grounds, where it was removed by the prisoner. He further contended that Clinton was far too drunk to drive the car at the time of the accident.

Then, too, he contended, that if the right rear tire was lost at the scene of the accident, the marks of the rim should be able to be traced out to the C. A. A. grounds and to produce the tire. The Attorney General claimed that such was the case. Why did not the Crown produce evidence on this point?

The next question is, who drove the car? Evidence of MacSachern and Livingstone is to the effect that the accused was able to handle the car well. Such an accident could only happen with a man who was in such a condition as was the prisoner's companion when he was driving the car earlier in the morning—or rather, learning to drive it.

Mr. Stewart went on once more to impress on the jury that the evidence should be such that the
