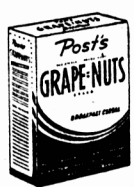

Recital And Concert At Long River

—A packed house greeted the pupils of Miss Frances Wells, and other performers at Long River Hall on Wednesday evening, June 2nd, when a combined recital and variety concert sponsored by Margate, Irishtown, Long River and Park Corner Women's Institutes was staged before an appreciative audience. Through the efforts of Mrs. Harold Laird interest was aroused in the obvious need for early musical training among our young people. The result was the organization of a music project, sponsored by a music club on behalf of Kensington High School and eleven W. I. groups on behalf of rural schools. An accomplished musician, Miss Frances Wells, who is a graduate of Mt. Allison University was engaged to teach the rudiments of vocal music in the schools.

The venture was one previously untried here, and there were many obstacles. One was the problem of transportation which proved especially difficult, due in part to the extreme weather conditions experienced in the winter of 1948. The question of an adequate salary made it necessary to include so many schools as the department of education makes no provision for the teaching of music and the entire amount had to be made up by the Women's Institute and by a music club organized at Kensington. However Miss Wells not only undertook the task of teaching vocal music in the schools, but fulfilled to the best of her ability, the great need for a teacher in piano, by taking up to sixty pupils, in various parts of the district. Even so, many would-be pupils were disappointed.

The work was begun in September of 1947, and in spite of bad weather and road conditions, and the fact that only one lesson a week could be given at best, Wednesday's recital, by pupils who had in most cases received no previous training, clearly showed what could be accomplished by regular training, given as Miss Wells said in her remarks, at least twice a week. A grant from the government to supplement local funds would make it possible to divide this district of 12 schools into smaller groups, with more than one teacher, but without such financial assistance, the Institutes, and the Music Club at Kensington have made an auspicious beginning. Recitals are being held in other parts of the district and if all pupils have grasped this opportunity, as did those performing at Long River, the experiment has been well worth while.

During the evening, Miss Wells gave a constructive talk on the project, designed to assist its future development, although, to the great regret of her pupils, Miss Wells will not be returning after vacation.

Mr. William E. Johnstone presided while the following program was carried out. Each number received wholehearted applause and in many numbers, an encore was demanded.

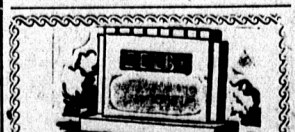

GOOD SURFACE NEEDED
Before paint is applied to an interior or exterior, make sure the surface is thoroughly dry and clean. If the old surface has a gloss, use fine sandpaper on it so the new coating can find a "toe hold."
Scrape off loose or cracked old paint and hammer down any nails that may be sticking out. Nail holes and cracks should be filled with putty but only after the first new coat has been applied!
An old wax and polish must be removed. Wash practically all furniture, first turn it upside down and paint the legs. Then place it right side up and do the top and sides.
Be sure to allow each coat to dry thoroughly before applying the next.
