Window Boxes, Potted Plants Need Constant Watering. TWICE A DAY IS NOT TOO MUCH DURING HOTTEST DAYS. GIVE WALL PLANTINGS A GOOD SOAKING EVERY OTHER DAY. DIP POTS IN PAN OF WATER; THEY WILL ABSORB MOISTURE IN A FEW MINUTES.

The most frequent cause of plants with window boxes and planters grown next to the wall is a lack of moisture. The reason is, of course, that such plantings do not get the benefit of rains on account of their closeness to the building. Even in a downpour, they might get only a moderate amount of moisture, although it seems like they are being drenched.

Window boxes and potted plants on the sill get the least natural moisture. Usually they are set flush against the side of the wall where the upper window ledge and the eaves of the house "protect" them from the rain. The small amount of soil in them prevents retention of what moisture they get, thus making them abnormally dry.

Waterings twice a day in the hot summer days is not excessive. During cooler weather the watering may be cut down to once a day. In the case of potted plants, it is a good idea to set them in a tray of water, so that the soil may absorb moisture as needed. If this is done, however, no more than a half inch of water should be kept in the tray as more than this amount will be as harmful as what you are trying to prevent.

The amount of water you have to give such plantings will depend somewhat on the type of soil you have in the box or pot. If it is composed of a third good humus,

The Wee Frees Denounce Dancing. SUSPEND MAYOR FOR CHRISTMAS PARTY. EDINBURGH, Aug. 19—"Promiscuous dancing" is denounced as a sin and the observance of Christmas as a "Roman practice" in an official statement issued by the Northern Presbytery of the Free Presbyterian Church of Scotland regarding the case of Provost Murray or Murray of Dornoch, elder, who was suspended from the rights and privileges of the Church for six months by the Kirk-session of Bywick Free Presbyterian Church because dancing was permitted at a children's party held at his house last Christmas.

After giving their support to the action of the Kirk-session, the Presbytery statement goes on:—"We would prayerfully and lovingly warn the young against promiscuous dancing and giving countenance to such a Roman practice as that of observing Christmas. 'Promiscuous dancing is a means of fostering the lust of the flesh, the lust of the eye, and the pride of life. These things are not of the Father, but are of the world. 'Such are not the real friends of their immortal souls who can actually stand up and tell us as a Church court that they themselves retired to rest and left a large number of young men and women to do as they liked till 2 a.m. 'We deeply regret how misguided Mr. Murray is in how he is misleading his family, and many of the young. We believe that the false charity moved these petitioners to ask us to tamper with the verdict of their Session. We advise them to seek forgiveness for their blameworthy conduct.' Provost Murray (according to the Dundee Courier) said he challenged the authority of the Church to interfere in a matter which, he said, was personal and domestic.

Questioned on the Presbytery's view of dancing, the Provost said:—"That is the opinion, but it is certainly not mine. I do not accept the statement."

FOUND GADGETS TO SAVE LABOR. (By The Canadian Press) LONDON, Ont., Aug. 19—Labor saving devices were the rage even in the days when an old spinning wheel was to be found in every home. Professor Fred Landon, University of Western Ontario librarian, has discovered. The library has just been presented with an old spinning wheel that has a device on it to save a lot of work on the part of the person doing the spinning. It is known as a spinning wheel. Instead of walking back and forth with a yarn, the spinner, sits still and lets the wheel swing toward him, and back again. The relic was presented to the library by the local union school picnic committee, after it had been repaired and reconstructed by J. E. Bycraft of Ilderton.
