**IMPORTANT MEETINGS.**—P. E. Island is having one of the biggest crops in its history, and the prices of everything, except potatoes, is much better than usual. The admission of P. E. I. potatoes to the American market this year would make a considerable difference in the value of the crop. The presence of Powdery Scab alone prevents their admission. Every farmer should attend the meetings that are being arranged and learn how to get clear of this bad disease. The first meeting will be held at Montague on Monday evening at 8 o'clock on Wednesday evening and at St. Peter's on Wednesday evening.

**RARE ENTERTAINMENT.**—Mr. Henry Lawrence Southwick, who is still so kindly remembered in Charlottetown, will give one of his matchless recitals in the Prince of Wales College Hall, Thursday evening, the 22nd inst. He has been invited again to the province by Miss Bertha Gorman, who graduated from the Emerson School of Oratory, of which Mr. Southwick is president. **FARM LABOR.**—Sometime ago Prof. Ross wrote a private letter to a friend in Toronto in which he set forth the splendid condition of P. E. Island as regards this year's crop, etc. Mr. Ross' friend took the liberty of sending a copy of the letter to one of the Toronto dailies. The Dept. of Labor made a note of it and wrote Mr. Ross. A suggestion was also made that as P. E. Island was scarce of labor it would be well to write the Minister of Labor for Ontario, as it was presumed they had excess of labor in that province. Mr. Ross wrote and a few days ago received a reply from which the following is taken. "We in this Province are in about the same position as P. E. Island as far as farm labor is concerned. Such labor has been scarce for some years past, and through our Colonization Branch we have been endeavoring to supply farmers with labor, some experienced, some partly experienced and some inexperienced. I think possibly the situation is not nearly so acute as it was a year or so ago. Since the outbreak of the war unemployed has been so general, particularly in the large centres such as Toronto, that we have appealed to the farmers asking them to endeavor to give employment where they could to men who would rather accept a small wage including board than live on charity. We have no surplus of good men for farm work in this Province. It will be seen that there is not much prospect of farm labor being secured from Ontario.

**A USEFUL PAPER.**—"Potato Disease" is the title of pamphlet that has been distributed by the Experimental Farm at Ottawa. It gives considerable information regarding powdery scab. Every farmer should bear the Dominion expert, Mr. John Adams, M. A., speak on this subject; but those who cannot get copies of this circular by applying to the Dominion Botanist, Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa. Mr. Adams will speak at Montague on Monday, Souris on Tuesday and later in Queen's and Prince Counties.

**PRODUCE APPRECIATED.**—Another shock to the high-priced dealers in produce, who for the past several weeks were charging prohibitive prices for potatoes and other necessities of life, was doled out last week, says the North Sydney Herald. It came in the arrival of a schooner from P. E. Island, loaded to the hatches with a cargo of products of farm, and is now being sold to anxious and thankful householders at fairly decent prices. Potatoes are bringing 35 cents the bushel—less than a third of what certain patriotic dealers were receiving. Turnips are selling for 30 cents the bushel, also about a third below the price charged by certain farmers a week ago. Oats sell for 55c., hay \$16 and straw \$9 a ton. For the benefit of the suffering masses, it might be added the schooner is discharging at Brennan's wharf. The above prices will no doubt fall on the arrival of another vessel from P. E. Island, where the greatest crops ever known in the history of that agricultural paradise are being garnered.

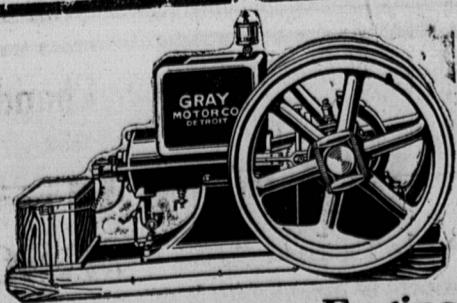
