Will Present Case Of Co-Operatives

SYDNEY, N.S., Aug. 19 (CP) - Next week the case for adult education and co-operatives in solving present day world problems will be placed before two world conferences by the extension department of St. Francis Xavier University of Antigonish.

On August 26, Dr. M.M. Coady now in United States, will take part in a plenary session of the United Nations at Lake Success on the world problem of conservation of natural resources. Dr. Coady will present the viewpoint of adult education and the role of co-operative organizations in the proper control of the world's natural wealth and its best use for the benefit of the greatest number of people. From New York Dr. Coady will go to Ottawa to appear before the Massey Royal Commission on behalf of the Canadian Association for Adult Education, of which he is national president to discuss the importance of adult education in the cultural life of Canada.

From Aug. 23 to Sept. 2, Alex Laidlaw, assistant director of St. Francis Xavier extension department, will attend a world agriculture conference at Tirrials, Costa Rica.

Moncton Lineman Fatally Injured

MONCTON, N. B., Aug. 19 (CP)—Carl Horsemann, 34, night trouble shooter for Moncton Electricity and Gas Company died here, reaching hospital tonight after being injured in contact with a high tension wire.

Dr. P. McL. Atkinson, coroner, had not decided tonight whether an inquest would be held. Horsemann was in charge of a crew repairing a break in power lines in the west end of the city and it was believed he had failed to sever all the lines before starting to repair the damage.

Fleet of Four Nations Led by Flattop Flagship

BATTLE-WORN VETERAN of naval operations in both the Atlantic and Pacific during World War II, the aircraft carrier H.M.S. Implacable, today flies the flag of the Commander-in-Chief, British Home Fleet, the 22,000-ton flattop is pictured (right) preparing to leave Mount's Bay, Cornwall, England, with a Western Union fleet comprising over 50 ships from Britain, France, the Netherlands and Belgium in the biggest combined exercises held since the war. Seen at anchor (below) the Implacable has proved worthy of her name: her first operational mission was against the German battleship Tirpitz, one of the 41 vessels she helped to sink or damage off the Nazi-held Norwegian coast. In 1945 her planes supported U.S. landings on Okinawa by pounding the Sakishima Islands, a few hundred miles from the air fields of the Japanese mainland.
