One Saturday in the Spring, he walked with her hand in hand into the near-by woods. He pointed out the wild flowers just coming out and told her legends concerning them.

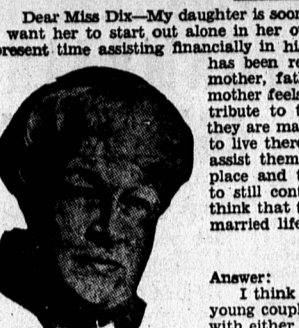

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THE COOK'S CORNER

INTERESTING BREAKFASTS

Of all the cereals that are made, there is none that has a food value superior to that of SHREDDED WHEAT. That phrase that we have all used for so many years "Whole wheat—nothing added—nothing taken away" is tremendously pertinent to health.

For those who like porridge there is nothing so nourishing and satisfying as Shredded Wheat Porridge and nothing so easy to make. Put the Shredded Wheat Biscuits in a small saucepan, add salt and a lump of butter (if desired) then enough water to cover the bottom of the pan; stir and boil until it thickens, serve with milk or cream. SCRAMBLED, FRIED, CREAMED, SHREDDED EGGS ON SHREDDED WHEAT BISCUIT

There are two ways of preparing Shredded Wheat Biscuits to be used as a toast for the serving of eggs; Biscuits may be buttered and heated in the oven, or moistened with water, spread with butter, sprinkled with pepper and salt and heated in covered frying pan or oven; then cover Biscuits with eggs prepared in any form to suit the taste.

ROCKS

Two cups rolled oats, 2 cups flour, 2 eggs, 1 cup brown sugar, 1 cup butter, 4 tablespoons sweet milk, 1/2 teaspoon soda, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 cup raisins, 1 cup walnuts, coarsely broken. Mix all the dry things together, then add butter, eggs and milk. Drop a teaspoonful on greased pans and bake.

A MESS OF POTAGE

Out in slices four small onions—enough to fill a cup—and cook in 1/2 cup of butter until yellow. Add a pint can of the red kidney beans and a quart can of tomatoes, sifted; cover, and cook until the beans are soft enough to pass through a pure strainer. Add 1/2 teaspoon of baking soda and a pint of hot milk. Season with a teaspoon of salt, 2 teaspoons of sugar, and 1/2 teaspoon of pepper, and thicken—1/2 teaspoon shows an inclination to separate with 4 tablespoons of flour blended to a paste with a little water, and stirred into the potage while over the fire.
