# Good Attendance At Race Meet

## Over Two Thousand People Attended St. Peters Bay Horse Races Yesterday Afternoon—2.13 Trot Won By Lucky Lindy.

Nearly 2500 people attended the annual St. Peters Bay Horse Races yesterday afternoon. It was warm with a very heavy westerly wind blowing, which retarded the speed of the horses and also caused considerable dust to blow around. Owing to the frequent rainfalls, the management were of the opinion that they would not be bothered with dust this year and did not take their usual precautions with calcium chloride, but this experience has shown them that it will be necessary in future to use it and thus the only disagreeable part of the program will be eliminated.

Secretary Quigley is to be congratulated on having such a splendid attendance right in the middle of haymaking. His success is due to the good program of races which are annually stages and the fact that St. Peters Bay race track is a pleasant meeting place for many people.

There were four classes on the program, with Starter Ed. F. Acorn handling the bell. His work yesterday was good, the scoring being kept down to a minimum and the program being finished shortly before six o'clock.

The fastest mile of the day was stepped by Lucky Lindy in the first heat of the 2.13 Trot and Pace, when he won easily in 2.15 1/2, a second and a quarter behind the track record established by Major Aubrey in 1929, also driven by Wellington McNeill. Perhaps the performance that stands out as the most notable was the second mile of the Classified Trot, which Kitty McKane negotiated in 2.17 1/2. Kitty is a real trotter and bred in the purple, being by Chestnut Peter and out of an excellent dam. Last winter she cleaned up all the fast trots on the

The Willys, Dixie Marque again fourth.

**Classified Trot**—This had five starters. Kitty McKane had the pole and got away nicely and led for the entire mile. There was quite a battle for second position, but Walkie out-trotted the others and finished at Kitty's wheel. May Cromwell also trotted a nice heat being third, Golden fourth, and Peter Wilton, Jr., fifth. Second Heat. They got away on the fourth score, Golden tucked in behind Kitty McKane, and stayed there for about one third of the distance when he made a bad break and lost a lot of ground. Getting back to his stride he rapidly closed up on the leader and was again tucked in behind, turning into the stretch, but in the race to the wire he could not get to Kitty who won in the wild drive in the excellent time considering the heavy wind, of 2.17 1/2. May Cromwell was a close third and Walkie who had made a break fourth. Third Heat. Kitty made a bad break at the word Go, Walkie also broke so Peter Wilton Jr., got out into the clear followed by Golden. Kitty settled down to trotting again and took the lead with Golden racing on the outside. They continued this way until the stretch when Golden out-brushed her, winning by a couple of lengths, Peter Wilton third, May Cromwell fourth. The Judges set Kitty McKane back for her running break and awarded the second position to Peter Wilton, Jr. who had finished third.

**2.29 Trot and Pace**—There were six starters in this class and they made a very nice contest. They got away at the fourth score and a good trotter showed up in Jolyset, owned by C. A. Bennett, Murray Harbor, who took the lead at the quarter pole and held it until the finish. In the race to the wire Great Village Belle beat out Sharpburg, who by the way was driven by his 75 year old owner, "Jim Ben" McMillan, Somerville. Waltz, a nice pacer from Souris was fourth. Second Heat. This was Jolyset rather easily, but there was a lot of excitement in the finish between Donna Harvester and Waltz, Donna coming through at the pole with a great sprint, beating out Waltz for second position, Sharpburg finishing very close to the others. Third Heat. This was one of the nicest heats of the whole day. Jolyset was leading when they turned into the stretch but in the race to the wire Great Village Belle first passed him, then Donna Harvester and then Sharpburg. Donna had the most and outfooted the others to the wire, the decision being close, Great Village Belle a nice second, Sharpburg a close third, Waltz and Jolyset only a length behind.

The first race called was the 2.13 Trot and Pace. This had four starters and was Lucky Lindy's without a shadow of a doubt in every heat. The excitement was in the contest for the other places. In the first heat Quinla beat out her rivals, Major S. and Leacock in a good strong drive. In the second and third heats, Major S. showed old time form winning second place each trip from Leacock and Quinla.

**2.25 Trot and Pace**—This had six starters and was a rather difficult field to get away. The first heat, Worthy Louise lead from the start, winning by two lengths with The Willys, who had gone an excellent heat, second, Louise Colorado third, Bingara Todd fourth. Second Heat, Dixie Marque led until the quarter pole when she made a break and Worthy Louise went by. There was a grand finish between Louise Colorado and The Willys, Louise beating him out for place, Dixie Marque fourth. Third Heat, Dixie Marque shot off into the lead at the word Go, and held out until the half when Worthy Louise went by. At the three-quarter pole The Willys also passed Dixie Marque followed by Louise Colorado. In the race to the wire Louise Colorado outfooted

ice in Maine, but previously racing manners had not been good enough to get her far on the clay. She had gone miles as fast as 2.10, but when it came to racing something seemed to go wrong. Yesterday she behaved real well in the first two heats and won her race. In the third she kicked up a bit. She is owned by Notting and Ross and has received her training from Fred Ross, who has her confidence and can handle her well.

# BEAUHARNOIS SCANDAL INVESTIGATION

Continued from page 1

which reads as follows: "April 30th, 1930. Expenses of trip to Bermuda Honorable W. L. MacKenzie King and self. Hotel Bermuda \$88.53. Fares Montreal to Bermuda and return \$395.04. Hotel New York \$188.75 total \$672.32."

"If one were to read this voucher without reading the evidence given yesterday by Senator McDougald, there might be some justification for headings, which would seem to place upon the matter the interpretation to which I have referred. Senator McDougald's evidence given yesterday, however, makes perfectly clear the fact that this voucher was one which put in, if not by himself by someone connected with his office, that it should never have been put in, that it was not a correct statement of his expenses and that it was in fact, wholly erroneous.

"May I say that at Easter of last year I paid a visit to Bermuda. On the way through the city of Montreal I saw Senator McDougald. He came into my car for a moment, and spoke to me there. I did not see him again until I arrived at Bermuda, and when I was leaving I found that Senator McDougald had been there during part of my stay had in part settled the account of myself and Senator Haydon, who accompanied me on the trip.

"Senator McDougald left Bermuda before I did, and I did not accompany him to New York. I saw him in New York, I stayed one night at the Ritz Carlton Hotel. The Senator himself was not in New York at the time; I had received word that he had accommodation there for Senator Haydon and myself and we stayed that night in the hotel. On the following day Senator McDougald came to the hotel with his wife with whom he had been in Atlantic City, and took up the accommodation he had reserved for himself. Senator McDougald did not pay any expenses whatever of either Senator Haydon or myself for transportation from Ottawa to Bermuda either by land or water, nor did he pay any transportation whatever from Bermuda back to Ottawa. All he did was to pay, himself, some of the hotel expenses while he had been a guest with Senator Haydon and myself there.

"May I say Mr. Speaker, that any attempt to draw an inference from the fact that on an Easter vacation I went to Bermuda with another member of this Parliament and was met there by a second member, and that this meant that in any way I was violating any matter of honor in any particular, is an inference which can not be drawn, by anyone who had an honorable mind. My purpose in going to Bermuda was two-fold: I had in mind first of all the need of some vacation at the Easter recess. As Hon. members know, whoever is filling the office of Prime Minister in Canada when Parliament is in session is very much in need of a rest on certain occasions. I took very few vacations during the time I was Prime Minister, and at Easter of last year when the House was having the Easter recess I visited Bermuda.

"I just wish to make that statement, Mr. Speaker, repeating that I am in no way responsible for any bills that may have been submitted by Senator MacDougald to the Beauharnois Company." Mr. King continued.

"I had no knowledge whatever of any such bills being submitted. I was horrified when I learned of the voucher that was presented before the committee; so much so that I immediately went to the Prime Minister and told him of my trip to Bermuda, and circumstances surrounding it. I fall yet to understand how any such voucher could possibly have been put in. I want the House to understand that any bills that were put into the Beauharnois company were not put in with my knowledge or with my consent, they were not put in by me for my account, but were put in by Senator McDougald with respect to expenses which he himself had incurred.

"May I add this further fact, which possibly I should have mentioned at the outset: that I had no knowledge that Senator McDougald had settled the account of Bermuda until I was about to pay my bill, when the clerk informed me that the Senator, before leaving, had paid the account—for the most part not in its entirety—and that therefore there was no further charge to be made in connection therewith.

"During the entire trip to Bermuda," Mr. King declared, "I never discussed the question of Beauharnois either with Senator Haydon or with Senator McDougald or with

# Magnificent Gift From Gyro Club

**This Evening The Expensive Radio Donated By The Charlottetown Gyro Club Will Be Presented. One Hour's Musical Programme Will Be Broadcast.**

The patients in the Provincial Sanatorium here will have after tonight, radio entertainment brought to their bedside through the generosity of the Charlottetown Gyro Club, which is presenting to that institution one of the most modern and up-to-date Sound Systems. This apparatus, a cut of which appears in this issue, consists of a rack six feet high and twenty inches wide carrying six aluminum panels on which are mounted the necessary dials and controls. This set is capable of picking up outside radio programmes, inside programmes such as Health talks by members of the Sanatorium staff or local concerts, and electric transcription programmes. These are conveyed to the patients over five distribution lines each carrying ten pairs of ear phones. An additional piece of equipment is provided in a turntable with an automatic record changer capable of playing ten records. This will give the patients musical entertainment when radio reception is poor. The entire Sound System is so designed that it may be extended to accommodate one hundred and fifty patients when the present Sanatorium is enlarged. This set is stated to be "fifty times more powerful than the average electric radio set in use in the home. This is a magnificent gift and speaks well for the initiative and generosity of the Charlottetown Gyro Club. The presentation this evening is taking the form of one hour's musical programme by Charlottetown artists and it is being broadcast over a Maritime network consisting of radio stations CFCY, Charlottetown; CFBO, Saint John, and CHNS, Halifax. A brief presentation address will be made by Mr. C. M. Williams, past president of the Charlottetown Gyro Club and it will be acknowledged by Dr. P. A. Creelman, Medical Superintendent of the Sanatorium. This programme will be heard from 8.30 to 9.30 o'clock, Atlantic Standard Time. It is interesting to note that this is the first Maritime Chain broadcast originating on Prince Edward Island.

# Applause For Conservatives at Milo Meeting

## Sharp And Ramsay Score Time And Again Over Opponents.

The Conservative candidates were given a very enthusiastic reception at the joint political meeting at Milo, Lot 9, on Tuesday evening. Mr. John McLeod very capably presided. The speakers in order named were Mr. G. Shelton Sharp, (Con.); Mr. W. H. Dennis, (Lib.); Mr. Austin Ramsay, (Con.); Mr. Adrian Arsenault, Summerside in support of Conservative candidates, Mr. C. I. Lidstone, (Lib.) candidate and Mr. A. J. Matheson, O'Leary, for the Liberal speakers.

Mr. Sharp opened the meeting and in an able address gave the electorate in a clear and concise form the planks of the Conservative platform as laid down by their leader, the Hon. J. D. Stewart. He compared these with the planks of the Liberal party as set forth by them last election and showed that not one had been fulfilled.

The enormous increase in debt through the extravagance of the Le Government and their failure to obtain our subsidy claims were all fully discussed by Mr. Sharp.

Law enforcement and the slipshod methods of the Provincial Government in regard to Prohibition was a strong point scored at the meeting. The speaker assured the electors that under the Stewart Government enforcement of the law would be made without fear or favour.

minute rebuttal amidst a tremendous burst of applause, Mr. Sharp effectually dealt with the boat at O'Leary, which Mr. Dennis had made reference to.

Mr. Sharp said that Mr. Dennis had got confused when he attempted to lay the blame of the building of the boat at Mr. Sharp's door.

Mr. Sharp said that he had found out from Mr. Barbour that no authority had come from the Conservative Government in regard to the boat.

Mr. Keith Matheson, (Liberal) son of Mr. A. J. Matheson and holding the position of customs and excise officer for Dominion Government, had built it. She had been ordered to be built for Mr. Sterling McLeod, Lot 16. Why a Dominion official is working for the Provincial Government, Mr. Sharp did not know. Mr. Sharp said he heard it remarked that Mr. Le had said, "You had better hurry up and get it into the water as there might be a change of Government and you won't get paid for it." Other matters were effectually dealt with by Mr. Sharp in his rebuttal speech.

A vote of thanks was extended to the chairman by Mr. Dennis, seconded by Mr. Lidstone.—S.

Mr. Sharp stated that last fall they seized 142 cases of liquor and the Government attempted to sell it to the New Brunswick liquor stores, but they refused it, as unfit for human consumption. It was later dumped over the wharf. But nine boat loads got away and that liquor, unfit for human consumption is what this Province is being flooded with. Referring to the road building, Mr. Sharp pointed out that while the Liberals had built a speed way into Charlottetown, we in 2nd Prince would have to wallow in the mud for the next 30 years to pay for it.

Mr. Dennis confined his remarks chiefly to the Public Debt. In a boastful way, Mr. Dennis said: "We know we have no platform and we are not submitting one to you. We have been running the country for four years and you must examine our record. That is what we are going to the country on."

Mr. Dennis went on to criticize the platform of the Conservatives as just promises. The Liberal candidate got somewhat badly tangled up when he started to talk about a mysterious boat that has been built in O'Leary.

Mr. Ramsay gave a convincing speech dealing with the issues of the day. He felt that Messrs. Dennis and Lidstone were taking cold feet in regard to the campaign, as in some of their remarks a feeling of defeat was creeping in.

Mr. Arsenault gave an inspiring address and was heartily applauded as he went over the record of the Stewart Government. He made some scathing remarks on the confessions of Mr. Saunders and Mr. Le on the Prohibition enforcement.

Other points of interest were aptly dealt with by this gifted speaker, who received an enthusiastic welcome.

Mr. Lidstone spoke for a few minutes, but gave his time to Mr. Matheson, as he said he was not feeling well.
