NEWS OF THE HORSES FROM ALL SOURCES

JAMES A. E. McDONALD, Little Pond, intends having his pacing gelding Almont J. put in training for the races this coming season, Almont is in good shape now and will likely take a place among the fast ones this fall.

THE CELEBRATED Clydesdale stallion, Lord Aberdeen, whose stock is known throughout the Province by all horse buyers and dealers, to be one of the highest priced on the market, will stand for the season of 1906 at his owner's stable, Kingston, Lot 31. Recently, Michael Hennessey one of the city teamster's sold a five year old Lord Aberdeen horse for \$300.00.

AMONG THOSE WHO were graduated from the Ontario Veterinary College last week was Alder A. Black, of Searletown, P. E. I. The graduating class was the largest in years, among its members being several students from the West Indies, one from the Argentine Republic and a number from the United States. The gold medal for the best general examination was won by a student from Trinidad.

JOHN WATTS, HAMPSHIRE, was in the city yesterday with his four year old Clydesdale stallion Orphan Jack. This stallion was sired by Crown's Rights, dam by Barstler, weighs 1800 lbs. and has won first prize every time he has entered the prize ring. He is of grand build and was admired by hundreds as he passed through the streets. Expert horse men claim him to be one of the finest horses ever raised in this Province. Mr. Watts is to be congratulated on being the owner of such an animal which is certainly an acquisition to the Island.

M. R. COX, did his first work of the season lately when he gave Grace Darling a long spin says the Frederickton, N. B., Gleaser, and yesterday he had 'Ald. Colter's Macduff' (2:20) in hand for a good working out.

About the middle of April the fine mare Ruth Wilkes (2:20) will be here for Mr. Cox to handle. She has been driven to Truro this winter by her owner, Mr. Learment, and outside of being a bit heavy she is ready to step out and go some at any time.

The other mare, Daisy Wilkes (2:24), is already under Mr. Cox's care and her owner, Hugh O'Neill, and many admirers look to see her have another successful season.

THE STALLION, Joe Patchen, Jr. 2:23 sired by Joe Patchen 2:01, the greatest sire of extreme speed the world has ever known, sire of the champion of all harness horses Dan Patch 1:54 and 17 others in 2:30 list out of 21 foals older than 3 year olds in 1905. Joe Patchen, Jr. dam is the great brood mare Bell of Edgewood, dam of 2 in 2:30 list. Louise Patchen 2:24 and Joe Patchen, Jr. 2:23, both records made over half mile tracks. Individually Joe Patchen, Jr. is a horse of grand finish and plenty of substance with a fine disposition that he will begot speed and grand road qualities there is no doubt, as he not only inherits but possesses these qualities in a marked degree.—This horse is owned by Fred Cameron, Charlottetown, whose stables are on Euston Street.

M. R. DODD DWYER, of Pictou, took his fleet pacer Joe Patchen, Jr., 2:23, up to Amherst lately, and for the free-for-all event raced on the ice there and lowered the colors of the fast Cumberland mare in short order. The heats were for a distance of half a mile, which was supposed to be in favor of the home horses as Timothy V. T. 2:19, had the reputation of stepping speed way halves close to a minute and Stephen T. 2:24, is at his best in the short distance, but it was Joe Patchen Jr.'s day and he outstepped them every inch of the way in fast time. The time given for the three heats was 1:04, 1:05, 1:03. If the time is correct Joe Patchen Jr. should be a good candidate for free-for-all track honors next season as halves at a 2:07 rate is an indication of speed that would tangle up the best of them.

THE TROTTER AND PACER says: Mr. George Estabrook, one of the most prominent road drivers of Denver, Col., and a gentleman who for a number of years has campaigned some prominent horses in the Grand Circuit, sold the past week to A. B. Eiter, of Amherst, N. S. Winfield Stratton, 2:03, Winfield Stratton first made his appearance on the turf at the June meeting at Denver in 1900, where he acquired a record of 2:24. The following year he reduced his record to 2:13 at Sedalia, Mo. In 1902, he made his appearance on the Grand Circuit and acquired a record of 2:08 at Cleveland, Ohio, which he reduced each succeeding year, until he closed last season. He has met and defeated at one time or another all of the best pacers of his class. When ever Winfield Stratton, driven by Joe McGuire, started in a race there was sure to be a horse race. Winfield Stratton wore the straps, but was always on a pace and did the very best he could. His new owner will find him a reliable horse and when he meets defeat it will be by a faster horse.

M. JOHN MCCOY, proprietor of the Commercial Hotel stable Frederickton has secured the well known stallion, Island Saladin, 39017, from Mr. Hugh McMonagle, the well known Sussex breeder, in exchange for Judge Wilkes (2:20).

Island Saladin is brown in color, by Elmo, 8074, dam Miss A. by Administrator, 357. His granddam is Jess by All Right, 3817.

Judge Wilkes was foaled in 1883 and has been owned by Mr. McCoy for about ten years while Island Saladin was foaled in 1898.

Mr. McCoy has been successful in putting through the sale of the well known race stallion Calandra by Andover parties, to Dr. Raddick, M. P.P., of St. Martins, N. B.

IN THIS COLUMN, in the issue of the 17th inst. was a paragraph concerning the horse Parkside Jr. He is a full brother to Ada Mac, 217, who now holds the race record of the Charlottetown Driving Park and has proven to be one of the best race mares Prince Edward Island has ever produced. Parkside Jr. is the sire of Parker L., 2:20;—King Edward, who is claimed to be the fastest three year old on the Island; and Parker C. He started in four races and has never been behind the money. In the last race he started with nine horses, and in the last heats led the field past the three quarter pole where he made a slight mistake and finished third, which goes to show that he is a race horse to the finish. Parkside, Jr., is the only horse in Queen's County, that has one on the list, and only three of his ges have been trained any for speed. He is a produce of speed as well as a big stylish driver. Horsemen would do well to look Parkside Jr. over before selecting a horse. He weighs 1305 lbs. and is a dark mahogany brown with good flat bone.

THE STATEMENT of the Frederickton Gleaser in regard to the Martime Circuit is incorrect in putting Springhill among the seemingly dissatisfied places. As a matter of fact, Secretary Welch says that Springhill has cheerfully accepted everything and is quite willing to carry out its parts in the Circuit. The only suggestion made by Springhill is that the Circuit begin at Springhill, thence on to Moncton and Fredericton. This was to prevent expense of travel, by doubling up the ground, as would be the case starting at Moncton, thence on to Springhill and back to Fredericton. However, in the present circumstances it is doubtful if the Circuit will be carried out in its entirety, though no doubt some of the tracks at least will aim to suit one another's convenience, as well as that of horse owners.

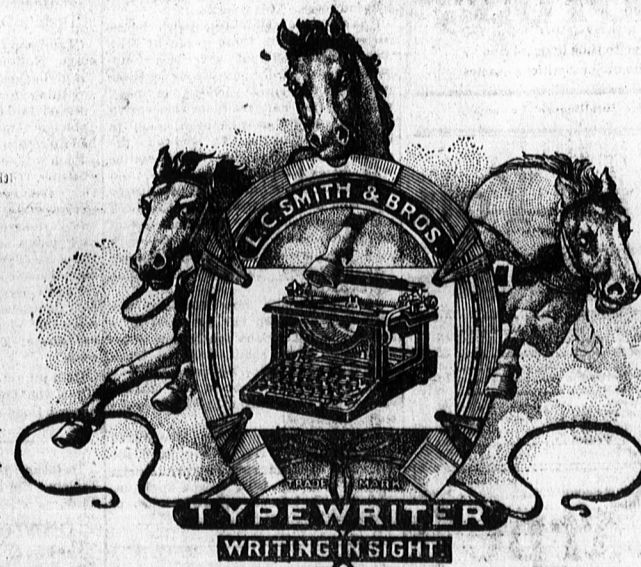
