A Tribute

TO THE MEMORY OF THE LATE LLOYD SHARPE AND EMMETT ALPHONSUS WILLIAMS

—Almost daily one reads in newspapers, or hears on the radio, accounts of fatalities, which take the lives of young and old, and these are usually read and forgotten—but when on Friday evening, March 19th, a message was flashed over the air, that two young men from our own community had gone to their death in a plane crash, the realization of what these tragedies mean, struck home with terrific force—bringing sorrow and grief, not only to relatives, but to friends and acquaintances here and elsewhere.

Only a few short months ago, Lloyd had accepted a position in Truro with the hardware firm of J. J. Snooks and Company, after selling out the mercantile business, which he in conjunction with his mother, Mrs. Bessie Sharpe, had carried on in Tyne Valley for several years. Even in that brief period, by his friendly and obliging manner, he had made many fast friends in Truro, as was attested to by the many expressions of sympathy, and the beautiful floral tributes sent to the bereaved family. But it is here in Tyne Valley where he made his home for the past twenty years, that his passing is most keenly felt, for one and all feel that they have lost a true friend, whose place in the community can never be filled. No appeal for help, or assistance in sickness or any other emergency was ever refused. Many times it might have been easier to have said No; but such was never the case. Lloyd always gave a helping hand—like the Good Samaritan of Scripture. "He never passed by on the other side". To quote the lines of a familiar hymn, "We are only remembered by what we have done" and for this reason Lloyd will be remembered, when many others may be forgotten. For they are not dead who live in the hearts of those who are left behind.

Lloyd was the son of the late Hon. G. Shelton Sharpe, who predeceased him six years ago. He is survived by his wife, and three daughters, Phyllis, Valerie and Shellah, also his mother, Mrs. G. Shelton Sharpe at Tyne Valley and one brother Foster, on the homestead at East Bideford, who mourn the loss of a dear son and brother.

The other victim of the tragic accident, Emmet Williams, was on his way to Truro with his brother-in-law, Lloyd Sharpe in the ill-fated plane, piloted by Mr. E. P. McCullough, to spend the Easter holidays with his sister and family at their home in Truro, when he too lost his life in the crash. He was the son of the late Thomas Williams and Mrs. Margaret Williams McNeill. He spent several years in Tyne Valley at various occupations, taking part in all the activities, sports, social affairs, and all that makes up life in a small rural center; and we counted him as one of our own young men. On leaving the Valley, he was employed in Summerside and in April 1942 he enlisted in the Army, but owing to ill-health he received his discharge and had to spend many months in Camp Hill Hospital. When his health was sufficiently restored, he returned to civilian life and was employed with the Horne Motor Co. in Charlottetown, which position he held at the time of his death at the early age of thirty-eight years.

He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Margaret McNeill, his sister Edna (Mrs. Sharpe) and one brother, Brinsley, to all of whom deepest sympathy is extended in their hour of sore trial.

On Monday afternoon, March 22nd after a brief service at the home of their aunt, Mrs. (Dr.) J. A. Stewart, where the remains were taken the previous evening

on their arrival from Truro, the funeral cortege moved to the Presbyterian Church, a short distance away, where an impressive service was conducted by the Rev. S. M. McDowell, assisted by Rev. W. A. Young and Rev. D. A. Yeo. The church, despite the inclement weather and almost impassable condition of the roads, was filled to overflowing with friends who had come from far and near to show a last tribute of respect to the departed. Mr. McDowell, under strong emotional strain, spoke words of comfort and hope to the sorrowing family and friends. Quoting from Matthew twenty-five verses, thirty-five to forty, he laid particular emphasis on verse 40, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto the least of these my brethren ye have done it unto me." Hymns, "The Lord is my Shepherd", "Lead Kindly Light", and "Peace, Perfect Peace" were sung during the service and by request a favorite hymn "Shall We Gather At the River" was sung by Mr. G. Roy Phillips.

At the conclusion of the service the remains were conveyed to the United Church cemetery, where all that was mortal was laid to rest side by side in the family plot. Beautiful floral tributes, with their expressions of love and sympathy covered the two new graves—the last gesture of love and respect that sorrowing friends could make.
