REGULAR MONTHLY MEETING OF THE CITY COUNCIL HELD

The Subject of Traffic and Law Enforcement Discussed by the Council. Change of Speed Limit to 15 Miles Per Hour Advocated.

The regular monthly meeting of City Council took place last evening in the Council Chambers, with His Worship, City Recorder Martin and all the Councillors present.

After the minutes of the last meeting and a special meeting had been read and adopted, the usual reading of bills paid and to be paid was proceeded with.

Councillor Prowse presented another bill for street machinery which he said was withheld until it was ascertained that the equipment was satisfactory. The equipment has proved satisfactory and the bill of \$3750 is certified.

Councillor Yeo reported that all the machinery called by contract is here. A communication from the Housing Committee was read, asking settlement of their claims for remuneration for their work. It was the opinion of His Worship and the Councillors who expressed their opinion that it was impossible to give the citizens' money for this purpose. The matter was referred to the Finance Committee for consideration who will report next meeting. The City Recorder said that the Commission could take no remuneration from the buyer.

A petition from twenty-six citizens in the vicinity of the condensed Milk Factory was read complaining about the drain of said factory. After some discussion on the subject, His Worship said it was a matter of the Board of Health who would take the matter up in meeting.

Resolutions giving authorization to the Finance Committee to issue debentures were read and passed. Councillor Yeo in reporting for the Street Committee reported that the City Engineer has commenced to lay the permanent pavements. Men have also been engaged in repairing the side walks of the city. The clay streets have been put in good repair and shall continue to be kept in good repair.

Councillor Moran reported for the Tender and Property Committee. He brought to the notice of the Council the menace which the ruins of the fire on lower Queen St. presents to the people. Letters had been sent to the owners, but nothing had been done so the Council should take some action. Councillor Yeo supported the contention of Councillor Moran.

OPENING OF NEW PARLIAMENTS ACTION WILL AT CANBERRA BE TAKEN

Duke of York Official at Elaborate Ceremonies—Honors Bestowed.

(Special to the Guardian) CANBERRA, Australia, May 9.—The culmination of the royal tour came today when the Duke of York formally opened the new temporary parliament building at noon in the new federal capital.

Lord Stonehaven, Governor-General and the Prime Minister Stanley Bruce were in attendance. The ceremonies were elaborate and picturesque. The Duchess of York was present and a huge assemblage had gathered from all parts of Australia.

In the course of his speech, the Duke of York said: "Today marks the end of one epoch and the beginning of another, and our thoughts turn instinctively to what the future may have in store. One's own life would hardly be worth living without its dream of better things, and the life of a nation without such dreams for a social ideal."
