15 Months Prisoner Is Now Bankrupt

VANCOUVER, B.C. Oct. 22. A prisoner 15 months in Okalla Jail for refusal to pay a \$5,000 judgment, Virginia Durante has just been declared a bankrupt. He remains in prison at the suit of Mrs. Jeanne Viennet, who seeks to collect a \$3,000 judgment. The machinery of the law requires the creditor to pay the board and lodging of the imprisoned debtor. Mrs. Viennet has in this manner paid out 50 cents a day to the Okalla authorities for the keep of Virginia a total outlay of about \$225. Mrs. Viennet hopes to recover from a deposit to Durante's credit in a bank in Italy. An impasse has been reached. Mrs. Viennet holds the bank book, without which the money cannot be withdrawn; and Durante refuses to sign a release.

Want Women In Courts Of Justice

TORONTO, Oct. 22.—Women side by side with men on the bench of every court of justice from the juvenile to the supreme court, is what Judge Helen McGill, of Vancouver, would like to see. She believes that their presence on the benches of the county police high and supreme courts would be a help, not only to the administration of justice in general, but to the work of the male judges. This theory she applies to include every public board mentioning specifically the mothers' pensions and the workmen's compensation board, and in explaining it, she said that accepting God's theory of a father and mother at the head of every family as an essential, this might be continued to the bigger families of public bodies.

On being questioned as to general belief that women offenders preferred being tried by a man, Judge McGill said that this was so, the reason being that women judges were often more severe than men and rightly so. "Men," she said, "are apt to be sentimental; their chivalrous instincts come out and the result is often an inadequate good of society or the offender."

Steamer Held As Home Bank Asset Was Rum Runner

(Canadian Press)

TORONTO, Oct. 22.—It was brought in evidence at the trial of Clarence F. Smith, of Montreal, director of the Home Bank, which crashed in August, 1923, on charges of making false statements of the affairs of the bank, that the steamer Vaudreuil, which was held by the bank as security on a big loan was operated as a rum runner between Glasgow and "Somewhere near New York" in the summer of 1922. The ship, according to J. Austen, of Montreal, who was secretary treasurer of the British Dominion Investment Company which chartered the ship to Walter J. Ellison, of New York, made two trips across the Atlantic with liquor as her cargo. Another ship, the Palpongo, also held as security by the bank as security on a big loan cargo between Canadian and United States ports. Mr. Austen said the company lost money on the boats.

Witness said that the papers and books of the British Dominion were available and Mr. McCarthy said the Crown would go into further details on the operation of the ships tomorrow.

Alfred C. Glenhie, who was Secretary Treasurer of the Daly firm at Ottawa, told of his history and affairs. The company conducted departmental stores in Ottawa, and running into financial difficulties closed down in February, 1923. The only asset was the building on which there were mortgages of \$107,000 and \$150,000. The building cost \$300,000.

The store business, he said, never paid.

Rump Parliament

ROME, Oct. 22.—The Communist party, through its press bureau, announced that at a meeting held in the Chamber of Deputies, it had been decided to propose that all deputies belonging to the opposition meet and legislate by themselves, forming a sort of "rump" parliament, which would be called a "parliament of the people against the Fascist parliament."

In addition to this proposal, the Communists adopted a program for the "rump" parliament which included the following: "First—transfer of the Matteotti crime from the judicial into the political field. "Second—means for depending the political syndicalist liberty of the laboring classes. "Third—to incite the proletariat against the reduction of wages, the increase of hours of work, and high prices."

Ray Rogers Committed In Test Case

WINDSOR, Oct. 22.—The preliminary trial in the King vs. Ray Rogers and Dudley Fraser, New Glasgow, was held in the Court House before Stipendiary W. C. Dunlop, R. H. Graham, K. C., New Glasgow, appeared for the accused trial in the Supreme Court. L. H. Martell, K. C., opened the case for the Crown, charging Ray Rogers with operating a gaming place within the town of Windsor on or about September 6th, contrary to the provisions of the Act against gambling. Several witnesses were called for the prosecution, including R. B. Dakin, complainant, F. W. Herman, George McElhinney, P. M. Fielding, Treasurer for fair. E. K. Morton and Dora Smith, acting secretary of the Hospital Board. The latter testified to the minutes of the meeting of the Board appointing a Fair Committee. H. W. Sangster was present in the interest of the Hospital Board.

The case is the first of the kind to be held here under the Code. Before it is finished, it is likely to attract the attention of all Canada. The Social Service Council and Hurts County Ministerial Association are behind Mr. Dakin in this prosecution, with the idea of having the law clearly defined. The action is likely to have a widespread effect.

LONDON, Oct. 22.—Praise of the Canadian National Exhibition as a business getter for British concerns in Canada had an opinion that it would be an even better one when the depression passed is given by G. H. Locock, assistant director of the Federation of British Industries, who superintended the British exhibit at the fair and who has just returned from a trip through the Dominion. "The success of the Exhibition will be even greater in years to come, when business conditions have improved in Canada," says Mr. Locock. "At the moment the feeling in commercial circles in the Dominion is somewhat depressed, since there is a considerable amount of unemployment, taxation heavily on the people, and the cost of living is high. But this is temporary, and when Canada's vast natural resources are developed the Dominion will have no difficulty in attracting and retaining immigrants of the right sort."
