AREA AND REPRESENTATION.

So far as our reading goes The Guardian was the first Canadian journal to raise the point that the large additions made to the area of Ontario in 1884 and to that of Quebec some years later was an act of injustice.

ice to the Maritime Provinces as affecting their representation. There is however an important point in connection with this addition which we have not yet touched upon. About 120,000 square miles of territory were added to Ontario, more than doubling its original area, and 118,000 square miles were added to Quebec as we have before stated. Before these additions were made the outlying territory beyond the bounds of the organized Provinces was the property of the Dominion that is, of all the Provinces jointly. What was the value of the gift of this vast area to the two big central Provinces?

The territory thus added to the two Provinces is, as we have said two and a half times as large as the three Maritime Provinces taken together. It is larger than the six New England States. It is almost twice as large as the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland. It is larger than France or the German Empire or than Spain and Portugal taken together. It contains a vast aggregate of forest wealth, mines of iron, silver, nickel and other metals which are now being exploited by rich companies with tens of millions of capital. It covers the Canadian water front of Lake Superior and a large part of Lake Huron and of James Bay as well. Everything goes to show that the gift of this vast territory was a very valuable one to Ontario and Quebec, and that in simple justice it ought to have been accompanied by like valuable gifts or concessions to the Maritime Provinces. As a matter of fact they got nothing in return. This was most unjust, entirely apart from its effect upon our representation as pointed out in previous articles.

What would remain for our Provincial Government and Legislatures to do, if we had county councils? asks The Examiner. What do the Governments and Legislatures of Ontario, Quebec, Manitoba, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick find to do? They all have municipal councils and yet they find a good deal to do. We invite our contemporary to read over the sixteen sub-sections of section 92 of the British North America Act for answer. To assume that the Legislature and Government would have nothing to do if we had the municipal system installed would seem to indicate a want of knowledge of our provincial constitution as well as a decided dearth of information in regard to municipal government.

Ontario has had the municipal system for fifty years. The Examiner says the adoption of the system in our Province would be not only an act of extravagance and folly, but would be a Radical rather than a Conservative measure. The Examiner's idea of true Conservatism is to be fifty years behind the times. Progressive Conservatives want to keep up with the times and if possible lead the procession. It was a Conservative leader, the late Judge King, who introduced the municipal system into New Brunswick thirty years ago. But he was not a Conservative of The Examiner stamp, it is quite needless to say.

The esteemed Examiner is something more than unconsciously humorous. It is downright funny at times. For instance, it is opposed to municipal institutions, but can find no other ground of objection to urge against the system than that it would add to the expense of carrying on public affairs. And yet in the same article it proceeds to tell its readers that if Sir John Macdonald could have had his way the Provinces would now be united in a legislative union, and "if his opinion had prevailed we should have had municipal government in this Province from the date of confederation, and should perhaps have been saved a vast amount of money and been better governed." Comment is needless on our part, but not on the part of The Examiner.
