Allan, M.C., Sergt. Percy Hooper, Sergt. G. G. McLennan, Sergt. Allan McCabe won the MacDonald Brier Match and the challenge shield for teams presented by the MacDonald Tobacco Company of Montreal. This is the most important team prize of the meeting. The shield is a magnificent piece of workmanship and the cash prize for the team is \$60. Teams from almost every important unit in Canada were represented in the shooting and the great marksmanship displayed by the Islanders is being highly commented upon.

were now helping the situation.

During the last year there had been a great distribution of breeding stock, especially of calves, throughout the province. One of the greatest errors of the farmers in this province was made in the matter of feeding. During the last six weeks pastures had suffered. The wise producer who had made provision in peas, oats and vetch mixtures did not suffer loss of milk production. The growing of roots, and of peas, oats and vetches reduced the necessity of purchasing feed from outside sources. If the farmers were to make a success of the stock raising they must depend more on the feeds grown on the farm.

In the cow, the hog and the hen, lay the agricultural salvation of the province, Mr. Shaw believed. The depending on one branch of farming, such as potato-growing, would result in trouble.

Mr. W. J. Dark, Brookfield, who represented the Guernsey breed of cattle, stated that he felt that there was a place for all the breeds of dairy cattle. He was glad to see that the Ayrshire breeders were advertising their breed. The Guernsey breed was increasing very rapidly in the past few years in Canada and United States.

Mr. J. E. MacIntyre, representative of a fertilizer company discussed the value of fertilizers in the growth of cattle feed in pastures.

Mr. Edwin Reid, Rollo Bay, paid tribute to the work Mr. Brown had done for the Ayrshire breed. Mr. Reid stated that he had bought his first Ayrshire in 1916, and had since bred two silver cup winners.

Mr. Gavin Reid, Victoria Cross, spoke briefly.

Mr. F. T. Morrow, dairy produce grader, stated he was deeply interested in improved livestock. He looked for the improvement of the dairy industry to be effected through the pure bred stock breeders.

Following the judging competition, Mr. Brown's splendid senior and junior herd bulls were inspected. Their points were indicated by Mr. Earl Ings.

## ISLANDERS DO WELL AT ALL CANADA SHOOT

### P. E. I.'s Rifle Representatives Make Good Scores in Dominion Shoot, Ottawa.

Island riflemen are making a good showing at the Dominion of Canada rifle matches, Ottawa, where over 500 of Canada's finest marksmen are competing.

In the Bankers' match, at 300 and 600 yards, possible 100 points, Sergeant Roy McCabe, Charlottetown, was 17th with 97 points, Captain A. W. Allan was 49th with 96; Signaller P. Landrigan was 41st with 95, Sergeant Stewart Moore 42nd with 95; Sergeant Allan McCabe 120th with 93; Signaller J. S. MacDonald 121st with 93.

In the Walker match, 300 and 600 yards, possible 70 points, Sergeant G. G. McLennan was 33rd with 67; Capt. A. W. Allan 49th with 66; Signaller J. S. MacDonald and Sergeant A. O. F. Gill 85th with 66 points; Sergeant P. Hooper, Sergeant A. Gornley and Sergeant Roy McCabe each scored 65 points and were 93rd, 94th and 103rd respectively.

The Prince Edward Island Highlanders team made an excellent shoot winning fourth place for teams in the Borden match.

In the individual shooting in Borden match Captain James Coles, Milton, was 31st with 36 points; Sergeant P. Hooper, Milton, 59th with 34 points; Sergeant G. G. McLennan 72nd with 32 points; Sergeant A. McCabe 120th with 27 points.

Signaller R. E. Jenkins was a prize winner in the Tyro extra series match, being 24th. Captain A. W. Allan was 48th in extra series match with a score of 48 points.

## SADDLE HORSES FEATURE OF THIS YEAR'S BIG FAIR

### NEW STABLE BEING BUILT TO TAKE CARE OF LARGE LIST OF ENTRIES, JUDGING TO TAKE PLACE AT NIGHT.

For the past several years very few saddle horses have been shown at the P. E. I. Exhibition. However, the saddle horse is coming back to its own and this year it is expected that upwards of three classes will be shown in the three classes including a number of horses from Halifax and other points outside the Province.

In addition to the Ladies' Saddle, Gentlemen's Saddle and Road Hack Classes which are commonly known as the Breeding Classes, there will be jumping exhibitions both by lady and gentlemen riders. It is expected that about fifteen horses will arrive from Halifax including about ten trained jumpers. Charlottetownians who attended the Halifax Exhibition last year and who know horses state that a number of the horses which are coming to our Exhibition from that city are of a very superior type, many having been prize winners at the Royal Winter Fair at Toronto.

The Charlottetown Riding Club was formed by a number of horse enthusiasts just one year ago and it has made steady progress during that time. Several local horses have been imported from the Club or individual members while horses have been imported from New York, Montreal and Toronto so that the Club has a pretty fine aggregation to show.

"Colonel Dick," a Kentucky bred saddle horse, imported from New York by Mr. George Buntain, is a handsome chestnut gelding with four white feet, weighing about 1100 pounds, perfectly trained in every way and has been a winner in many horse shows.

"Robinhood," imported by Raoul Raymond, of Southport, from Montreal is a handsome red gelding of sufficient size to carry a man of Mr. Raymond's weight. He has perfect action, is a six year old, well trained and took first place in a Montreal show last year.

"Pat Aubrey," owned by Dr. Seaman and winner of the under 15-2 hand class last year will be shown as will be "Whip-poor-will" winner of first prize in the over 15-2 hand class in Charlottetown last year, owned by C. N. Bissett, President of the Charlottetown Riding Club. Both of the second prize winners in last year's classes will be on hand as well as a large number of other entries from the local Club including Miss Charlottetown, a dark bay mare from Calgary, and Count Mah, a fast stepping roan colt bred and raised by Frank McKay, East Royalty, sired by the great Axworthy.

Mrs. George Buntain's mare Snuff is a La Copia purchased in Alberton, is one of the best of the local jumpers and should give a good account of herself both in the Ladies Saddle Class and the jumping contest.

Judging to take place Wednesday night in front of grandstand. A new feature will be introduced this year when the judging of the Saddle Class will take place on the race track in front of the grandstand Wednesday evening. The Exhibition authorities are giving every cooperation to the horse owners and have a large number of workmen engaged at the present time in building a large new stable containing about forty box stalls to accommodate the saddle horses.

These stables are being built on the field the extreme west of the grounds and a gate way opens immediately onto the track.

P. E. I. has been called the Kentucky of Canada and there is no more reason why it should not be the center of saddle horse activities in the Maritimes than it is of harness racing activities. No part of Canada is better suited naturally for the development of the saddle horse than the immediate vicinity of Charlottetown.

## Brilliant Tennis Features Nova Scotia Tourney

### Third Day's Play Sees Sparkling Tennis As Halifax And Upper Canadian Stars Advance.

SYDNEY, N. S., Aug. 16.—Today's play in the Nova Scotia tennis tournament was easily the best so far, with two matches outstanding. In one, Curry Young of Halifax, eliminated a former champion in A. C. Wiswell, also of Halifax, in the men's singles in straight sets 6-1, 6-4. In the other Com. J. C. Edwards, Ottawa, defeated "Red" Haire, Yarmouth, 6-3, 6-0.

#### Edwards-Haire Match

The Edwards-Haire match was witnessed by a large gallery and treated the fans to some brilliant tennis in spite of one-sided scores in the second set. Edwards proved entirely too steady for his opponent. The straight set defeat of Wiswell by Curry Young was the first time in a great many years that the veteran Halifax star has been beaten in straight sets early in the tournament. Young by virtue of his win will now meet Peter Aitken of Liverpool, another seeded player.

#### Advance Third Round

Bev. Piers, Harry Roper, T. S. Neate, Hugh MacLennan, and Milton Musgrave, all of Halifax advanced to the third round in the singles, the first four winning in straight sets with Musgrave having to battle hard to win out over Bob Leslie, Kentville, in three sets by scores of 6-3, 5-7, 6-2.

Bob Barnard, Montreal, and L. Rennie, Toronto, were the Upper Canadian stars to advance, both winning easily and getting into the quarter final round. Miss K. Doyle of Halifax, scored two brilliant wins in the women's singles to advance to the last eight. First she defeated Mrs. Roper, Halifax, 6-1, 7-5, and later eliminated Miss Mary Sullivan, of Bedford, 6-2, 6-3.
