Needless to say, Mr. Morrissey, who is an enthusiastic angler, is delighted with his prize, which may be said with truth, is likewise an object of envy and admiration, to his less fortunate fellow sportsmen.

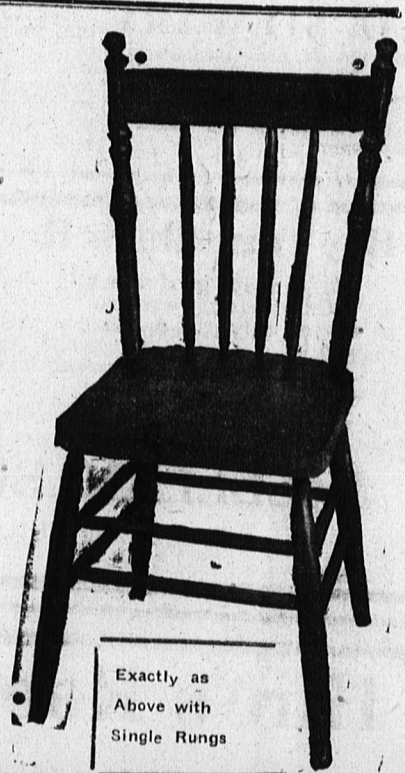
