LONDON, June 26.—The highest paid newspaper writer in the world, David Lloyd George, yesterday announced his decision to abandon journalistic work after this year.

This work has netted him in the neighborhood of \$600,000 in six years, more than three times as much as he made when he was prime minister of England. But he is giving up his lucrative job with the fourth estate to return to politics. He said that he will devote himself to a revival of the Liberal party and to working out a victory for that party in the coming general elections.

FIVE TRUE BILLS FOUND BY GRAND JURY YESTERDAY

Lengthy List Of Criminal Cases On Supreme Court Docket.—Evidence In MacKinnon Case Not Yet Entirely Examined.— Will Be Reported On This Morning.

The Trinity Term of the Supreme Court opened yesterday morning with His Lordship the Chief Justice and associate judges Hassard and Arsenault on the Bench. The Grand Jury, owing to the large number of criminal cases on the docket, was unable to hand in their report yesterday, but it will be read at this morning's session. True bills were found against Clarence Power, for perjury, against Henry McAlister, Lewis Binns, Emanuel Mallet and Frank Weeks for stealing.

In the case of the King vs. Archibald MacKinnon for manslaughter, the evidence was not completely examined. The case will be reported on this morning.

At the close of the morning session on application of Mr. J. D. Stewart, Mr. David L. Mathieson was called to the Bar.

"The list of cases" said His Lordship, the Chief Justice, in charging the Jury "which you will have to take is regrettably long. There are six bills of indictment, and in each case it will be necessary to hear the witnesses for the Crown. The first case is the King vs. Clarence Power, a crime has been committed."

His Lordship then read the bill of indictment in the case, and the summary of evidence from the stipendiary magistrate's court.

Walter Power, the brother of Clarence Power had been convicted of robbing a man by the name of Heron. An application in appeal was made and heard before the full court, and the Clarence Power appeared and swore that it was he, not Walter, who had committed the crime. If this were true, then the wrong man had been convicted.

But the Supreme Court upheld the conviction and now he is charged with swearing falsely that he himself committed the crime.

This is a most unusual case, and very far in the annals of the court to find a similar one. You will hear the evidence in the case, and if you decide it is one which should go to trial, you will bring in a true bill. Remember, it is not your function to pass upon the guilt or innocence of the accused. That is the duty of the petit jury before whom he will be tried.

If you think the case is a frivolous one, and that there are no reasonable grounds, then you should bring in "no bill."

(At this point, a Juror, who came in late was sworn and instructed not to take any part in the deliberations on the Power case.)

The second case was that of the King vs. Henry MacAleer, indicted for housebreaking.

In this case, George W. Dockendorff testified that on the 19th of February last, he saw two men crossing the ice in the direction of the summer bungalow of Mr. D. Edgar Shaw at York Point.

They disappeared under the bank, and in going down, he found the two men, the accused and an unknown person.

The door of the bungalow was forced, and the lock was lying on the snow.

His Lordship instructed the jury that when raising a window which was down constituted the indictable offence of breaking. It made no difference whether the house was a summer cottage, unoccupied during the winter, or an ordinary dwelling, the offence was equally grave.

It is possible that the accused was there— one was against Frank Weeks charged with stealing a separator from the C. N. R. at Winsloe Station on or about the first day of July of last year.

The evidence showed that the agent had ordered from the DeLaval Company four separators all to be delivered at Winsloe siding. When Mr. MacInnis came to take delivery only three separators were there— one was missing. Afterwards the separator was found in the possession of Frank Weeks. It bore a serial number, which was borne by one of those in the consignment. Evidence was adduced to show that the DeLaval Separator Company gave each separator a different serial number, there being no two such numbers the same.

It is possible that a stolen article might have been obtained quite honestly. A person might have bought it from the thief, without knowing how it was obtained. What is he to do when found in his possession? He tells the truth. But if he makes false statements as to how it came into his possession, then he opens the way for his conviction for the presumption is that he obtained it dishonestly. No stronger proof can be had of guilt than such false statements.

In this case the accused claims he had got it from a certain party. But this man had gone away two years before the separator was stolen.

It is your duty, said the Chief Justice to determine whether the story told by the accused is true. His Lordship next turned to the charge against Archibald MacKinnon for manslaughter. In this case there is much evidence which is not in dispute at all, he said.

There is no doubt that a quarter to one on May 13th last a Ford car was driven up Pownall Street at a furious rate. There were two young men in the car, but so quickly did they disappear after striking down the victim that their identity was not definitely established. There is no doubt that the life of a good man—a peaceful citizen on his way home from church—was suddenly snuffed out. A few minutes before he was talking to his friend, Mr.

Progress, brought to a close the third day of its fourth congress. Addresses were delivered by Rev. W. J. McGlothlin, of Greenville, S. C., and Rev. T. R. Glover, of St. John's College, Cambridge, England, on the life and works of the Puritan Mystic, who though born a tinker's son had earned a worldwide influence on religious life.

A Bunyan Memorial window was presented to McMaster University on behalf of the Baptists of the world.

TORONTO, Ont., June 26.—The Baptist attitude to Church Union received a clear explanation at the Baptist World Alliance today in an address by Dr. George F. W. Patterson, president of Acadia University, Wolfville, N. S.

The common heritage of Protestantism must be preserved for the world, he declared, even though the distinctive tenets of Baptism be lost. Notwithstanding this the speaker maintained that in the present state of the Protestant world, Baptists had no alternative but to continue as a separate denomination. Organized religion, Dr. Patterson pointed out, was always influenced by the economic, industrial and financial conditions of the time. The present was the day of mergers of big business and large organizations. So there were many overtures looking to a union of churches.

"The fact that Baptists were meeting today as a world alliance showed that they felt that they were justified in continuing as a distinct church. Nevertheless they did not want to cut themselves off from the main stream of Protestantism. The things which Baptists held in common with other Protestants were vastly more important than the points on which they differed. Baptists were not antagonistic to other Protestants as they were eager for competition with them."

"We are well aware," said the speaker, that Baptists have no monopoly of Christianity. It is more important that men be Christians than that they be Baptists. But while competition and rivalry between Protestants may exist the time was not yet ripe for an abandonment of the separate existence of the Baptist church.

Indeed the speaker doubted if church union was really as desirable as some of its proponents thought, while organic union ought not to hinder liberty of thought and freedom of criticism but he felt sure it would. Even in small groups there was a tendency to improve creeds by major votes. He felt that possibly the Baptist church itself was now too large and that all its recent growth was not "God's increase." The need of the church was not to be large but to be better.

Rev. T. Z. Cody, of Greenville, S. C., was scheduled to speak on "the vital principles of our common faiths" but in his absence owing to illness, his address was read by Dr. Truett, acting president.
