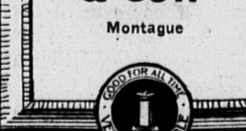

## THE FULL FLOATING AXLE SURE WAY TO GET RID OF BLACKHEADS

The full floating axle is the type whereby axle shaft is used only for the purpose of turning the rear wheels; load and thrust being borne by the bearings on and in the axle housing. Its assembly is similar to the three quarter type of axle, also, its suspension is similar the difference being that the axle is contained in the wheel by a star or cross-foot that sets into like sockets on the wheel hub, and is retained in position only by the hub cap. To summarize, in the case of a live axle the load is carried by the axle shaft and the wheel will come off if the axle breaks. In the semi floating, the load is carried by the axle housing, but the wheel will come off if the axle breaks. In the three
