"Oh, damn your silliness. A hanging matter! When I'm behind you?"



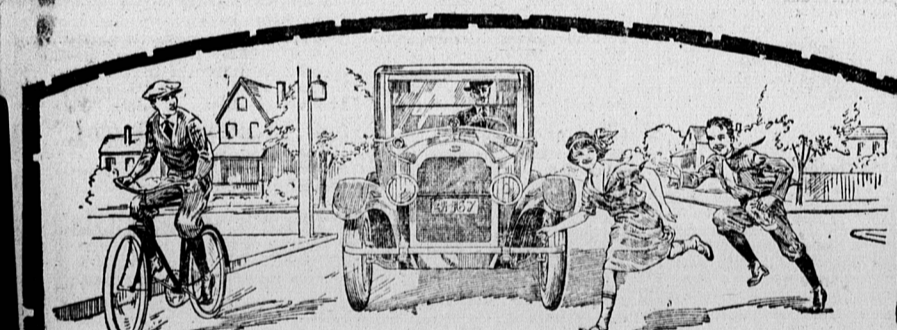

Cycling Safer Than Walking

A CHILD who suddenly darts out from the sidewalk into the road in a game of tag, or one who jumps from behind a standing vehicle, is far more likely to be run down by a motor car than a child on a bicycle.

German Dye Workers and Great Britain

SENT HISTORY OF GERMAN ADVANCES TO BRITISH MAKERS—BY SIR HARRY BRITTON, K. B. E., M. P.

The advances made by German dye-makers for a working agreement with the biggest manufacturers of British dyes have naturally attracted the widest attention not only in the Old Country but through out the Dominions. Welcome as such interest must be, some inferences from it have not been quite definitely related to fact. Indeed, perhaps innocently, perhaps for political ends, the truth has been even turned upside down and a story circulated to the effect that it was the dye-making industry of Great Britain which, begging for an alliance, went to the Fatherland cap in hand.

The actual event, on the contrary, was a remarkable tribute from Germany to the strength of a young British industry which had, practically speaking, grown up during the war and since the Armistice; and the reason why the Germans were driven to a diet of humble pie is neatly contained in two figures. Before the war they were supplying eighty per cent of the dye-stuffs used in Great Britain. Today Great Britain is supplying more than that eighty per cent in dyes of a satisfactory quality from her own resources. This latter total is not just a claim put forward by British dye-makers. It has been openly accepted in public debate by the color-users themselves. No; the most enthusiastic of Germanophiles must accept the accomplished fact that the world dye situation has been utterly altered by the Great War. In 1914 Germany was indeed dye-stuff maker to the civilized globe. Since then, however, Great Britain's full working capacity has leapt up to some 95,000 tons of dye-stuffs in a year. The United States can turn out almost as great a quantity.

Switzerland, France, Italy, even have all forged ahead. Nor is it without significance that the Color Index recently published by our Society of Dyers and Colorists of Bradford deals with 1,236 dyes as against the 1,001 in the pre-war German work which it has replaced.

At first the German dye-makers were aggrieved by this lost leadership, so much so that they alone refused to co-operate in that record of the world's color-makers. Then, with characteristic adaptability, they decided to make the best of a bad job, with the result that an invitation to talk over a truce came to the British dye-makers in the autumn of 1921. During the intervening two years and a half there have been several such informal conferences between the dyemakers of the two countries, all aiming at the establishment of a working arrangement which would be fair to both sides. The vital fact about these negotiations, however, has been the insistence throughout on the part of the British representatives that, while some arrangement with the German organization might be welcome to everyone concerned, no such arrangement could be entertained for a moment if it violated in any sense the fundamental principle that the British dye-making industry must remain adequate for our needs both in peace and war.

Now Britain's dyemakers are already within measurable distance of supplying in their entirety the cotton, the woollen and the other coloring industries upon whose goods an annual £200,000,000 worth of British trade depends. Already, as I have said, they can supply eighty per cent of that total demand. Such an achievement is now completely regarded as a complete insurance against foreign economic domination or the dangers which might once more arise were foreign sources of supply to be again cut off.

But no pending truce with the German makers will be tolerated could it in the remotest degree disturb this function of providing British consumers with such a proportion of their demands as will enable them to carry on in whatever circumstances the country may find itself and at the same time afford a sufficient plant and scientific equipment to provide the forces in the field with all military chemicals if we should be engaged in another war.

Both by the possession of immense natural resources and the right of initial invention the great key industry of synthetic dye-making came from the first to have belonged to Great Britain. With its coal, and its distillation products of coal, Great Britain has always, in regard to raw materials, been very advantageously placed as compared with Germany, or indeed with any other country anywhere. Nothing in the future will be suffered to interrupt the development of that natural superiority for the benefit of the entire Empire.
