MAGISTRATES HEAR EVIDENCE OF WITNESSES

Preliminary Hearing in Manslaughter Case Opened Yesterday

Eight witnesses were heard yesterday as the preliminary hearing of Judge C. Gavan Duffy of Charlottetown, charged with manslaughter, opened before Magistrates John F. Whear of Charlottetown and L. B. Mellish of Montague.

This morning the Magistrates are to view the scene of the accident at Stanhope and the cars involved in the collision. The hearing will resume at 2 P. M.

Crown Prosecutor D. Edgar Shaw, K. C., is conducting the case for the Crown and Mr. H. F. McPhee, K. C., and Mr. R. R. Bell are appearing for the defense.

Witnesses examined yesterday were: Dr. R. J. Ledwell, Dr. G. L. Smith, Dr. J. E. Blanchard, Anthony Reardon, W. C. Cook, Thomas Horgan, Jr., all of Charlottetown and Aeneas McDonald of Stanhope and George McDonald, Tracadie.

Evidence heard yesterday was in a large part a repetition of the evidence heard at the coroner's inquest.

Thomas Horgan, the chief witness testified of having driven the Horgan car on the night of the accident. He was cross-examined at considerable length as to the approximate speed of the cars, the lights, position of the wheels of the Duffy car after the accident, etc.

AMOUNT OF ROT UNCERTAIN.—"We do anticipate some rot in potatoes due to the effects of late blight but so few fields have been dug that the extent of the damage is not known" Mr. S. G. Peppin chief potato inspector for Prince Edward Island told a Guardian representative yesterday. Late blight was prevalent in most sections of the province, he said, and would cause the greatest damage in fields that had not been thoroughly sprayed. In most fields the potato tops are completely dead and it is expected that digging will be under way in all sections of the Province by the end of next week.

On July 14 the Liberal press published the text of an order-in-council, passed by the Campbell Government as follows:

"Council having under consideration the desirability of a National Park in the Province doth hereby recommend to the Government of Canada the establishment of a National Park on the premises known as 'Dalvay-by-the-Sea' at Grand Tracadie in Queens County, including construction of a dust-free highway or highways leading to the said National Park from the City of Charlottetown and the village of Rustico, the necessary steps to be taken by the Government of Prince Edward Island for the acquiring of the said premises, and such adjacent lands as may be necessary to form a site for such proposed Park. It being understood that if on actual inspection any other location in the Province shall be agreed upon by the Dominion and Provincial Government as a more suitable site for such National Park, then the plan for such National Park shall be diverted to such more suitable site."

It is evident that since the above order-in-council was published (it bears no date in the Patriot's citation) there has been a political tug-of-war and that opponents of the Dalvay site have been appeased "for the present at least" by having this desirable summer resort excluded.

FORT SMITH, N.W.T., Sept. 22.
