A WARNING TO PARENTS.—What might have resulted very seriously occurred at Brighton shore yesterday afternoon when two young lads, playing on floating ice off-shore, fell into the water. They were picked up by an older boy, and one of the drowned lads aged about ten years old was taken to the Young Women's Christian Association rooms, on Brighton, where he was given warm drink and clothing. He was later taken home to his parents on Pownall street. The other lad was also taken home. Neither are apparently any the worse for their misadventure, which should serve as a warning not only to themselves but to many other youngsters who are making a practice of playing at "sailing" on the floating cakes of ice near the shore. A resident of the vicinity informs the Guardian that this has been going on for some time at Brighton. It has been suggested that the police authorities keep a vigilant eye on the shore and wharves of the city at this time of year. Parents also might be more careful in seeing that their children of this nature do not occur.

EDUCATIONAL MEETING.—A very interesting meeting took place at Rustico Hall on March 31st, when teachers and rate-payers of Rustico parish met to discuss matters pertaining to schools and to education in general. Mr. H. Martin presided and Mr. Moise Gallant recorded the proceedings. Rev. Dr. Chiasson gave valuable aid and laid great stress on the importance of a good elementary education. Education in its broadest sense did not mean simply a knowledge of the sciences, but the training of the mind, the formation of a good character, and a proper guidance in acquiring habits. Regular attendance, punctuality and diligence, were conducive to a healthy education. Inspector Gallant gave a report on condition of schools, and dwelt at some length on the needful co-operation of rate-payers in providing the necessary equipment for work in the schools, and in looking to the comfort and hygienic conditions. Children acquire an education through observation, and it is therefore our duty to see that the surroundings are such as to cultivate their taste for what suggests neatness, cleanliness and attractiveness. Mr. Moise Gallant spoke well, and dwelt along some lines as the presiding speaker, and several meetings had recently taken place in Rustico, where the addresses were all of very high order. Mr. Gallant gave also some very wise counsels re the duties of parents and teachers towards the school children. Mr. Angus Buote spoke along the same lines of regular attendance. Other speakers who took part and lent valuable aid to the meeting were: Miss Helen Gallant, teacher, Messrs. Moise Gallant, Domitien Gallant, Andrew Gallant, Theophile Blanchard, Jernie Dolron, Isidore Gallant, Felix Gallant, and Peters. All these showed by their remarks a healthy knowledge of the educational needs of the present day, and a helpful attitude towards raising the standard of their schools. The meeting closed with Ave Marie Stella. God save the King.

THE REV. J. C. SPURR

The Rev. J. C. Spurr, a well known Baptist minister, passed away to his rest and reward at Hantsport on the 27th of March. For some years, after retirement, he had been a resident of Hantsport. His cheering smile, fund of humor and gaily example rendered him an object of attraction and his familiar form is now missed on our streets. He had labored over 40 years in the ministry the greater part of which was spent in P. E. Island, where he did good work. At Cavendish he toiled for some time, the first field of labor of the Rev. Dr. Geddie, the pioneer missionary of the New Hebrides. He was a good pastor and very regular and attentive in his ministrations to the sick and suffering.
