WHEN WOMEN TAKE A HAND

MANY OF THE NOBLEST CHAPTERS OF THE WAR SOLE WORK OF WOMEN.

When disintegration began in Russia and all was black with the clouds of impending doom, the women of that sorely tried land organized Battalions of Death, and stepping into the breach, attempted by their example to sweep over the country. The women of Canada have given abundant proof that they are as devoted to the common cause as were the women of Russia. Happily they will never be called upon to the extent of organizing Battalions of Death, but they are ready to give all that may be measured in terms of sacrifice and service.

On Saturday, June 22nd June, the women of Canada, of sixteen years of age and over, will record their names and capabilities for the information of the State. They will thereby provide the Government with the information necessary to a full use of the enormous store of energy which the women of Canada are capable of throwing into the struggle. The mothers, wives, sisters and sweethearts of the glorious Canadians overseas have already accomplished a prodigious work in the Allied cause. Registration Day will afford them the opportunity of laying the foundation for even greater and more effective effort.

SIXTEEN NEW AMERICAN CITIES

Some idea of the vast extent of the work involved in building cantonments for the new national army is given in the following paragraph from Edward Hunkerford's "The Camps of the First Half Million" in "Everybody's": "Sixteen new cities for America! Sixteen cities, each of the size of Easton, Pa., or Elmira, N.Y., or Kalamazoo, Mich., each built to a definite and fairly common plan, and all completed within from 100 to 120 days. Here, then, was some slight measure of the problem, considering the building of a community of wood and steel in population to Cleveland or Pittsburgh or St. Louis; then the division of that great town into sixteen separate communities or cantonments—an average of one for each three states—and spread all the way across the face of the land from the coast of Massachusetts to the state of Washington.
