EXPECTS EARLY DRAMA REVIVAL

WINNIPEG, Dec. 24.—(CP)—"Some say that the theatre is dead, but we know that we are just on the verge of a rebirth of the drama," said Henri Bougeard, French consul, in an address on the post-war theatre in France to the Alliance Francaise du Manitoba here.

"The pre-war playwrights had the mastery of their craft but lacked the public. The modern playwrights have the public but sometimes lack the skill, M. Bougeard said.

"Play dealing with the war itself were not as good as they should be because it was not yet possible to view the war objectively as a great epic.

"Comedy today was of a higher standard than the other forms of drama. Although there was little essentially new in the themes of modern playwrights, most of which had been anticipated before the war, there was a greater variety of treatment and this indicated a revival of drama in the near future."

Christmas Business Said "Extra Good"

Charlottetown merchants yesterday reported "extra good" Christmas business which would likely compare favorably with Christmas trade last season.

The fall trade, due to the mild weather, had been slow as customers delayed purchasing of heavier garments. However, a decided change was noticeable as a result of the cold snap of the last few days.

In the poultry market turkeys and geese were said to be scarce with prices soaring during the last few days. Turkeys at present were bringing from 28 to 32 cents a pound while 23 to 25 cents a pound was being asked for geese. There were prospects of both being scarce up until the New Year.

Geese in the Market Building were sold at an average price of \$2 each, not being sold by weight. Chickens, however, were reported plentiful, the price remaining steady at 25 cents per pound.

Fry-Cadbury Ltd. To Enlarge Plant

Evidence of confidence in the business outlook is supplied by the decision of Fry-Cadbury Limited to build a 4-storey addition to their cocoa and chocolate factory at the corner of Masson and Delorimer.

The new building, already under construction, adjoins the main plant on the South side and covers an area of 100 ft. x 56 ft.

According to W. P. B. Wrege, Vice-President and Managing Director, the additional factory space is required to take care of the increase in business experienced by the company this year and which they confidently expect to continue during 1938.

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Labor Union Elects State At Meeting

Mr. James P. Cullen yesterday was re-elected President of the Laborers' Protective Union, No. 3568, at the annual meeting in the Union Hall, Charlottetown. Daniel Coughlan was re-elected vice-President.

Other officers included, Arthur Gormley, treasurer; Daniel Gillis, financial secretary, re-elected; Lemuel Rush, recording secretary, re-elected; Joseph Ramaghan, guardian; Frederick Byers, guide; Joseph McDonald, re-elected; Frederick Hughes, re-elected, D. Gillis, trustees.

The present scale of wages was "far from satisfactory to our members and more changes must be made," said recording secretary Lemuel Rush in his report. He hoped to be able to report a better scale and better working conditions next year.

Bingo receipts totalling \$325.50 were announced by Mr. Rush. "Bingo has been carried on in a very successful manner and this executive extends our thanks to our brother members who by their gentlemanly conduct and able support made this game as played in our hall very popular with the public."

In Memoriam

Charlottetown has lost another of its best known citizens in the person of William Arthur Miller, who died at his residence, 249 Euston Street, Wednesday afternoon.

Mr. Miller, who was in his 69th year, took ill about two months ago.

After spending a week in the Prince Edward Island Hospital he went to Montreal, where he underwent an operation in the General Hospital.

Two weeks ago he returned home, accompanied by Mrs. Miller and their daughter, Mrs. Trueman. Since then he gradually became weaker until he breathed his last.

The late Mr. Miller was born at Marshfield, June 8th, 1869, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Miller, the latter being Miss Emily Ann Boyer, a daughter of the late Robert Boyer of Bunsbury.

Mr. Miller Sr. was a son of James and Margaret Miller, both native of Scotland, the father being born on the Clyde River near Glasgow and the mother in the Highlands.

They came to Prince Edward Island in 1818 settling first at Lot 35 where James Miller became one of the most successful farmers of that locality. He had at one time 435 acres of land. He was extensively engaged in live stock and dairy farming.

His son William located at Marshfield, and like his father, was also extensively engaged in farming, specializing in the breeding of horses and Ayrshire cattle. For a time he was manager of the Provincial Government Farm at Fairwood.

For a number of years and until his father's death in 1911, William Arthur Miller also carried on farming on land adjoining that of his father.

On the latter's death in 1911 he disposed of his farm and purchased Oakwood, the beautiful Wright property on the St. Peter's Road on the outskirts of Charlottetown.

Here he took up fox ranching on a large scale, having at first as his partner, the late Mr. E. R. Brow. They were among the pioneers of the industry in this section of the province.

About nine years later Mr. Miller purchased the Brown residence on Euston Street and resided with his family there, although continuing the fox ranching at Oakwood, associated with his son, W. Frank Miller.

The late Mr. Miller was a worthy member of a family that was highly honoured and respected throughout this province and whose efforts materially contributed to the advancement of our great basic industry, agriculture.

He was a man of a high order of intelligence known for his strict integrity in all his business dealings, and held in the highest esteem by a very wide circle of friends.

Just as he had achieved success in general farming through his industry and intelligence, so he was equally successful in fox ranching, and became an expert in that line.

Like his father, the late Mr. Miller, he was a stalwart and consistent supporter of the Liberal party and was always active in organization work.

Although a true son of the soil, and always devoted to agriculture and live stock breeding, Mr. Miller was also interested in antique furniture and Currier and Ives prints, of which he acquired a valuable collection.

He was a true friend, charitable, sympathetic and companionable, with a keen sense of humor.

He was in all respects an excellent citizen, and his loss will not only be felt in city and country, but more especially in the home, now bereaved at the joyous Christmas season, and where the family mourns the loss of a loving and devoted husband and father.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. James Alberta Lillian Simmonds, daughter of the late John Simmonds of Marshfield, and a sister of J. P. Simmonds of this city; also by one son, William Frank Miller in Charlottetown and two daughters, Jean, wife of Mr. A. W. Trueman of Sackville, member of the staff of Mount Allison University, and Ruth, wife of Mr. H. D. Henderson, also of Sackville and burar of the same institution.

He also leaves one sister, Mrs. John MacFarlane, Marshfield, and one brother, James of Calgary.

He will be laid to rest this afternoon in Sherwood Cemetery the funeral to be conducted by Rev. Dr. Legate, pastor of St. James' Presbyterian Church, of which the late Mr. Miller was a member.
