TO DRAIN SWAMPS

TORONTO, Ont., Nov. 3.—Systematic drainage of Northern Ontario Pulpwood swamps, with a view to increasing the growth of the timber thereon, may shortly become a policy of the department of Lands and Forests of Ontario. One of the department's big present-day problems is how to provide for reproduction on cut-over lands and to increase as rapidly as possible the growth of available timber stands. For two years the Provincial Forestry Board, headed by Dr. C. D. Howe, Dean of the Faculty of Forestry, University of Toronto, have been giving close attention to the problem, and they have found, through experiments conducted in the Abitibi district, that black spruce lands, systematically drained, have brought about growth in the timber, which compared to growth under old swampy conditions, is nothing short of remarkable. Another way in which the Forestry Board is endeavoring to retard the enormous speed at which black spruce is being cut in Northern Ontario is by converting pulp operators to the use of jackpine, balsam, and other soft woods.

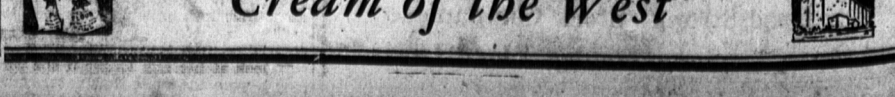
