Question Of 'Port' Or 'Part' In Agreement

 HALIFAX, Sept. 8.—Did a misprint make its appearance in reports of the United Kingdom-Canadian agreement at the Imperial Economic Conference, or did the agreement specify that goods, to be eligible for preference must be consigned from an Empire port? The question is raised editorially in the Halifax Herald, in quoting from a statement of J. H. Rainville, President of the Montreal Harbor Commission.

"I am particularly interested," he said, "in the words which appear in Article 1 of the Canadian-U. K. agreement, viz: 'Goods consigned from any port of the British Empire and grown, produced, or manufactured in Canada.' etc. If this reference is correctly understood by us it means that the preference on wheat would not be applicable to wheat exported from other than a Canadian port."

"Port" or "Part"

"It all depends," says the Herald, "upon one letter in one four-lettered word. Is that word 'Port' or 'part'. If it reads 'any part of the British Empire' the situation takes on a different complexion entirely.

"Some newspapers printed the word 'part' and some printed it 'port'. We have checked the matter with Ottawa and are advised that the printed copy of the agreement reads: 'any part of the British Empire.' Unfortunately, at the moment the original term of the agreement is not available to scrutiny. Our own belief is that the word is 'part' and not 'port' and that there has been a misreading of Article 1 by those who have seen in this article a formal declaration of principle of the use of all Empire channels for Empire traffic moving under Empire preference.

"This, however, would not mean that the Conference did not decide upon this question so vital to Canadian transportation systems and harbors, certainly, the question was discussed almost daily at the Conference and the impression was left at the Conference closing that something was to be done about it."

Word Is "Port", Says Ottawa

OTTAWA, Sept. 8.—The wording in article one of the agreement reached between Canada and the United Kingdom at the Imperial Economic Conference, of which question is raised in a Halifax editorial, according to the official copy given out by the liaison officer dealing with the press on conference matters, was as follows: "... goods consigned from any port of the British Empire, etc."

Aches Threatens Ruth

DETROIT, Sept. 8.—Babe Ruth, the New York Yankee's perennial candidate for home run hitting honors, left for New York tonight to be examined and treated for what he fears is an attack of appendicitis.

He was seized with severe abdominal pains late today and left with his wife for New York. The seriousness of his illness probably will not be known until he reaches New York and is examined by the club physician.

Distance Swim Stars To Marry

TORONTO, Sept. 8.—Margaret Ravior, three times winner of women's swim marathons, announced today she will become the bride of George Young at her Philadelphia home on November 23. They will live in Toronto at the house presented by the city to Young after he won the Catalina swim in 1927. He plans to open a training camp for young swimmers at Bracebridge where he has built a log cabin. Miss Ravior revealed her earnings during the last three years were \$18,000, and she does not expect to race again.

lice court. The case was remanded until September 15 by Magistrate R. M. Noble.

The thefts are alleged to cover a period from November 5, 1925, to June 22, 1932, and the charge was based upon an interim report received from the University auditors. John Allen, K.C., who represented the Crown, explained to the court that the large amount included a figure of \$47,451.37 contained in the original charge against accused, and might have to be amended later if the auditor's final report showed further shortages. Mr. Machray did not plead personally or through his counsel to either charge before the remand, which had previously been agreed to by counsel, was announced.

Bail was fixed for the second charge at \$50,000 in outside securities and \$50,000 by Mr. Machray himself. Bondsmen who went his surety on August 25 were released in connection with the first charge and signed new bail bonds for a similar amount on the second.

Total imports from the United Kingdom during the year ended with July last were \$96,592,408 as compared with \$125,604,882 the previous year. Exports to the United Kingdom for the same periods were respectively \$167,150,287 and \$204,449,993.

TORONTO, Sept. 8.—Canadian failures numbered 54 against 60 last week. Last year, for the corresponding period, 43 defaults occurred.

There has been a marked drop in the number of business failures in the United States during the past week, fewer defaults being recorded than for any week in the past two months. The records of R. G. Dun & Co. show 589 insolventcies, against 648 the preceding week, 650 during the first week of August, and 436 a year ago.

Says Britain Agrees Canada's Claim Right

ECONOMIC UNION OFFICER COMMENTS ON RUSSIAN DUMPING STAND.

MONTREAL, Sept. 8.—The British attitude is that Canada's request at the Imperial Conference to have dumping of Russian products in the United Kingdom stopped was in order. S. G. Soman, secretary of the Empire Economic Union, said today. The British Government must, however, be left to see to the machinery used to bring about this end which should be applicable to all countries.

"Great Britain gave trade facilities to Russia," Mr. Soman said, "in return for the assurance that no Bolshevik propaganda would be disseminated in Great Britain or the East. This arrangement was a matter of extreme difficulty to negotiate and should not be thrown over without serious consideration."

"While I am in no doubt of the ability of the United Kingdom to deal with any propaganda in that country or the East, the whole question deserves mature reflection."

The question in all its ramifications could not be settled at the Ottawa perley, he said, which was a good argument in favor of the suggestion for an Empire secretariat. "It is obvious," he continued, "that whatever success the conference may have had, there must be matters left over which the new Empire spirit will arouse. If a secretariat along the lines of that of the League of Nations were established, all preliminaries, such as Russian dumping, would be dealt with and Empire statesmen would find it easier to reach final conclusions."

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
