THE PARTY SYSTEM.

A good many years ago in a school which the writer attended, it was the custom, after school hours, on every soft day of the winter season for the boys whose homes were "up the road" to join in a snowball fight with these living "down the road." The centre of each battle line was held by the leaders, the older and stronger boys, and in this part of the field there was a good deal of hard hitting, which sometimes placed a snowball fighter out of action till the next day. There was always plenty of ammunition which was manufactured on the field. The best skill of the combatants was directed to the making of good hard snowballs, and projecting them with force and accuracy.

About all that could be said in favor of these daily recurring battles was that they added a certain zest and interest to the monotony of school life and that they gratified a certain innate liking for contest and victory. This is about the best that can be said in favor of the party system in politics. It has been contended that but for the party system interest in the country's affairs would languish, that in difference and apathy would prevail, and that this would prove more beneficial than the exciting and sometimes embittered strife of parties. Anyway it is an admitted fact that wherever free representative institutions exist, in Britain, France, Germany, the United States, Australia and Canada, the party system has come in.

As for the matters in controversy between our two great parties in Canada at the present time they are about as invisible and unimportant as those which the schoolboys referred to contested on the snowy roadway. It was different in earlier years when great questions of equal civil rights, responsible government, tenant rights, the introduction of railways, confederation, industrial protection, the extension of the franchise or the abolition of dual representation were at issue. These are settled questions today, and we search in vain for any great principles of legislation or of administration about which our parties are divided. Our parties are fighting each other for no better reason than the love of the fight, the hope of victory, the desire to win or retain the honors and spoils of office.

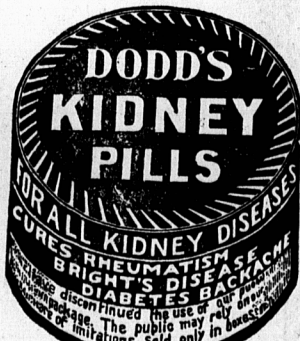
Yet the party system abides with us, and seems likely to remain for years to come. Canadians are notorious political partisans. There is much more of independence among the British electorate, something more even in the United States, than there is in Canada. Our one greatest need seems to be a larger measure of

of independence in the electorate, in the press and in our representatives. The latter now follow their leaders with all the meek unanimity of a flock of sheep, whether they believe their leaders to be right or wrong. The worst party job obtains their endorsement quite as readily as the most useful public measure. It would add to rather than detract from the interest in public affairs if electors would boldly vote against an unworthy candidate of their party, and if representatives would refuse to condone by their votes the wrong-doing of their leaders. Such a measure of independence is best for any honest party as it is best for the country. In greater independence among electors and representatives lies in the best hope of saving Canada from the growing evils of the party system as now exemplified.

These lovely autumn days serve as a reminder that in the Island the early fall is a good deal more pleasant than the early spring.

Among recent improvements is "dustless floor oil," adapted for use on wooden floors in school houses, halls and public buildings. One application in a year is claimed to effectually prevent the raising of dust by sweeping or the trooping in or out of a large assembly. A janitor of a large city school is quoted as saying there is never any necessity for dusting after sweeping where the floor oil is in use. It is described as free from odor and unobjectionable otherwise, and the cost is moderate. Dust spreads disease and contagion and is as inimical to comfort as it is to health. We mention this improvement as a very desirable one for trial in our schools, halls, churches and merchants' shops. It promises much in the way of health, convenience and comfort, to teachers, pupils and others.
