CAMPBELL GOVERNMENT CALLS FOR NEW LOAN AFTER DISSOLUTION

The Canadian Press announced yesterday that the Campbell Government had sold privately in Montreal \$300,000 of 2 1/4 per cent one to three year bonds through the investment firm of Mills, Spence and Company.

The bulletin reads:—

MONTREAL, May 8.—(CP)—Announcement was made here today of the sale by Prince Edward Island of an issue of \$300,000 in 2 1/4 per cent one to three-year serial bonds, to the investment firm of Mills, Spence and Company.

Proceeds of the loan will be used in part for maturities and for general purposes of the province. The issue is being placed privately.

Challenge Goes Unanswered By Hon. Mr. LePage

Liberal Financial Failure & Tax Increases Scored By Conservative Speakers At Afton Hall Meeting

A challenge issued last night by Mr. R. R. Bell, Conservative candidate, to Messrs E. W. LePage and Angus MacPhee, Liberal candidates, to have their own or any other bond expert tell the people the financial condition of Prince Edward Island in 1935 bracketed with one in 1935 remained unanswered at the close of the Afton Hall meeting.

Despite the fact the Liberal platform in 1935 contained the word "economy" and promises by a number of Liberal candidates at that time to resign if the budget was not balanced deficit after deficit was expressed in no uncertain terms.

Further the Liberals declared they "could and would" balance the budget "wherever" he was effectively answered by the speaker mentioning one instance, the large increase in motor truck taxes. DUKE VOICES APPEAL FOR WORLD PEACE

Plea, By Duke Of Windsor, Made From The Battlefield Of Verdun.

VERDUN, France, May 8.—The Duke of Windsor appealed tonight to "all political leaders" to rise above "purely national interests" to avoid war. His words were broadcast and carried. It was understood, with the approval of his brother, King George VI.

Before the Duke spoke from this Great War battle sector, a responsible source said he had exchanged wireless communications with the King who was aboard the Empress of Australia en route to Canada.

The King was understood here to have given his personal sanction for the peace broadcast, although the Duke in his speech made it plain he spoke for no one but himself.

He urged national leaders to bury "jealousies and suspicions" to negotiate by "mutual concessions in which conflicting claims can be adjusted."

The former King Edward VIII, in his first broadcast since his abdication message to the British Empire in 1936, said he spoke "simply as a soldier of the last war whose most earnest prayer is that such cruel and destructive madness shall never again overtake mankind."

"For 2-3 years," said the Duke, "I have deliberately kept out of public affairs and I still propose to do so. I speak for no one but myself, without the previous knowledge of any government."

The Duke said he was breaking his "self-imposed silence now only because of the manifest danger that we may all be drawing nearer to a repetition of the grim events which happened a quarter of a century ago."

"It is in a larger spirit than that of personal or purely national interests that peace should be pursued."

No Plans For Visit To States

VERDUN, France, May 8.—(AP)—In reply to a question by the Associated Press as to whether he and the Duchess intend to visit the United States after King George and Queen Elizabeth have completed their trip, the Duke of Windsor tonight gave out the following statement: "We have no intention of going to America in the near future."

Pontiff Eager For Peaceful Solution To World Problems

LONDON, May 8.—(CP Havas)—Pope Pius is endeavoring to convulse conference to seek settlement of some of the most difficult problems now disturbing Europe.

While official comment was not forthcoming, it was said several Labor members of Parliament plan to question Prime Minister Chamberlain in the House of Commons tomorrow on the nature of the representations known to have been made last week by representatives in Germany, France and Poland.

Persistent reports said the Pope, through the papal nuncios, informed French, German and Polish Government leaders that he was eager to see the problems of Europe swiftly and peaceably regulated and was prepared to take an active part to seek a concrete settlement.

In some quarters it was asserted the Pontiff suggested convocation of a conference bringing together Great Britain, France, Germany, Italy and Poland in an effort to solve the Danzig and Franco-Italian differences.

Steps Taken For Defence Of Bermuda

HAMILTON, Bermuda, May 8.—The Colonial Government of this strategically placed British island has had "under very full consideration" measures to protect the island in the event of war. Hon. W. J. H. Trotter, a member of the executive council, said today in reply to a question asked in the House of Assembly.

Asked if the Government was considering means to prevent war profiteering, what steps were being taken to protect the colony and if any warships had been designated for the protection of Bermuda, the Government spokesman replied that "the executive have had under consideration practically all the points raised" and had given them "very full consideration."

Faces Charge Of Homicide

NEW YORK, May 8.—(CP)—Accused of shooting to death his former sweetheart, John Pasquale, 26, of Hoboken, N. J., was held without bail for the Grand Jury today by Magistrate Troy in Pelony court, Ridgewood, Queens, on a charge of homicide.

Pasquale is alleged to have killed Miss Elizabeth Leslie, 26, a hairdresser, on April 26. Pasquale told police Miss Leslie had fallen in love with another man.

CITY COUNCIL MEETING HELD LAST NIGHT

Declare June 14, Date Of Royal Visit, Public Holiday.

At the regular monthly meeting of the City Council last night His Worship Mayor Foster stated that Thaddeus Knockwood, Lennox Island Indian would be presented with the Royal Humane Society's bronze medal for his work in rescuing Harold D. Moore from a train wreck last Dec. 6th. Mr. Moore, an engineer on the Island railway suffered severe injuries from scalding when the train which he was driving jumped the rails near Bloomfield. His Worship has already received the medal and members of the Council viewed it last evening. Presentation will be made at a date to be decided upon later.

Liberal Candidates On Defensive At Long River Meeting

Political oratory flared forth on the first Queen's point last night in the first joint political meeting of the campaign held in the district of Long River. Messrs L. T. Beaton and Walter MacKenzie scored their Liberal opponents Messrs D. N. MacKay and W. F. A. Stewart.

Mr. MacKay thought that Liberalism had made quite a good showing, but made no reference to the National Prohibition, Government to task for their "mis-rule" and their complete failure to implement policies which they "hood-winked" the electorate in 1935.

Mr. Stewart sought ineffectively to defend the record of the Campbell Government. He left the impression that "it was impossible to tell from the tone of his remarks whether he was a Liberal, Conservative or an independent."

Mr. MacKenzie after taking the "Liberal 30" to task for failing to carry out election pledges, but to the contrary increasing taxation and at the same time increasing the debt went on to ably deal with the Conservative platform and felt that the time was ripe for the government under the leadership of Hon. Dr. MacMillan.

Mr. Murdoch MacLeod, a resident of Long River district, who spoke briefly said that one of the causes of the increased indebtedness was due to people making many demands on the Government.

Negotiations With Russia Also Said Nearing Climax

Offer Of Great Britain To Mediate In Polish-German Dispute Receives 'Cold' Reception In Berlin.

LONDON, May 8.—Great Britain today offered to mediate between Poland and Germany over the future status of the Free City of Danzig. At the same time British Ambassadors at Moscow and Ankara continued negotiations designed to bring Soviet Russia and Turkey into the non-aggression front.

A military alliance on a modified scale is expected to be announced this week, perhaps Wednesday or Thursday, between Britain and Turkey. The terms, it was believed, would be much stronger than the Anglo-French guarantees to Poland, Rumania and Greece.

The alliance was reported to have these main provisions:—

1. Turkey will line up with Britain in any war in the Mediterranean area in which Italy is on the opposite side.
2. Turkey will fight alongside Britain in any war in the Balkan area providing the Russian negotiations result in a satisfactory agreement.
3. In return Britain, and probably France, will extend territorial guarantees in Turkey.

Approaching Climax

Anglo-Russian negotiations were approaching a climax in Moscow where Sir William Seeds, British Ambassador, saw Vyacheslav Molotov, Soviet Foreign Commissar, and presumably gave him the British note in reply to the Russian proposal for a military alliance among Britain, France and Russia.

The British note did not rule out a military alliance but suggested that a first step should be a Russian declaration that the object of outside aggression, Greece, Poland, Rumania, Czechoslovakia and Turkey if any of them was the object of outside aggression.

The note suggested the proposed Russian declaration should become operative only if Britain and France actually went to war as a result of their pledges.

Prime Minister Chamberlain told the House of Commons Britain is seeking the "fullest co-operation with Russia" in the formation of an anti-aggression front.

Plane Crashes Killing 18

GUAYAQUIL, Ecuador, May 8.—(AP)—A military airplane crashed in downtown Guayaquil today taking the lives of at least 18 persons in the crash and the fire that started from an explosion of the plane's gasoline tanks.

Piloted by Captain Cristobal and warrant officer Gale Espinosa, the plane plunged suddenly to the city streets. Fire spread quickly from the exploding gasoline tanks and burned down four houses before it could be controlled. The two aviators were burned to death in their plane.

The mechanic was slightly hurt.
