Berlin Protests Against Censorship

BERLIN, via London, Jan. 15.—The debate on the censorship bill being continued with unabated vigor in the budget committee of the Reichstag. The present system of controlling the home press and the news service to foreign countries is being energetically attacked by representatives of all parties, who are virtually unanimous in demanding the liberty to discuss questions of international policy, and who insist that the German people has shown itself cool-headed, mature and patriotic enough to be permitted to look the situation in the face and form its own judgments on events and on the nation's problems.

A Socialist speaker expressed belief that the time had come when discussion of the aims of the war could be permitted, with advantage both at home and abroad. The censorship, said the Socialist speaker, acted one-sidedly, and passed attacks upon the executive committee of the Socialists, but suppressed the committee's rejoinders.

A national Liberal speaker lamented that the press had been forbidden to mention that crowds had gathered in front of the butter stores, and other developments in the food situation. This gave the hostile press abroad an opportunity to circulate exaggerated accounts of alleged disorders, to encourage the people of hostile nations, to continue the war.

The Socialists demanded that newspapers be suppressed, only with the consent of the Chancellor in each particular case.

GOOD ROADS CONGRESS TO MEET IN TORONTO

MONTREAL, Jan. 15.—With over 30,000 invitations being sent out at the end of the month by George A. McNamee, Secretary of the Third Annual Canadian and International Good Roads Congress, to be held in Montreal, March 6th to 10th a conservative estimate of the attendance of bona fide delegates is 2,000. When the first Congress was held in Montreal in May of 1914, the attendance was about 800, while at the Congress in Toronto last year this record was nearly doubled, over 1400 delegates being present. With the constantly growing increase of interest in the subject of Good Roads, and the large attendance expected this year, it is certain that the Congress will attract a goodly number not only of the governmental and municipal representatives and officials who are most nearly connected with the planting and carrying out of the work, but also of private citizens, especially from the agricultural districts, who have come to realize how intimately their welfare, prosperity and productivity are bound up with the provision of safe, smooth and permanent highways. The invitations are going out to Dominion and Provincial Legislatures, Ministers, Government Engineers, Mayors, Reeves and councillors of cities, towns, villages and townships, wardens and councillors of counties, road contractors, manufacturers of supplies, members of boards of trade, engineering societies and other bodies, directly or indirectly associated with the Good Roads Movement. Many of those who come will be equipped with the expert knowledge and the actual experience which will enable them to impart valuable information. Others will be able to furnish illuminative details in the discussions which will follow the various addresses and papers still others will bring problems which the collective wisdom of the gathering will help to solve, and those who come only to listen and learn will return to their homes equipped with their duties with a vast fund of useful data and a larger outlook upon the whole question of Good Roads.

The usual exhibition of machinery and accessories will be held in connection with the Congress, and for this purpose 25,000 square feet of space have been set aside at Soldier Park the scene of the gathering. That the Dominion Government recognizes the educative value of this exhibition is apparent from the fact that the Department of Customs is allowing all exhibits to enter Canada duty free.

Teutons Begin Attack on Allied Positions in Balkans

ROME, via London, Jan. 15.—An Athens despatch to the Giornale D'Italia, says:—

"An attack by the Teutonic allies on the Entente positions has begun with a bombardment of the British lines in the Doiran zone, which lasted the entire day.

"The attacking troops are distributed as follows:—

"The Germans on the west front around Monastir, the Bulgarians on the Gievgeli-Doiran line, the Turks on the east flank.

ROME, Jan. 15.—The attack of the Teutonic allies on the Entente forces defeating Sabaiki is being developed on a large scale, according to the Athens correspondent of the Giornale D'Italia, telegraphing under Tuesday's date. He reports that a bombardment of the British line to the Doiran-zone proceeding all day Monday. The German commander of the attacking forces, says the correspondent, will make use of Austrian, Bulgarian and Turkish forces. The participation of the Turks has been doubtful, he adds, but it is now certain that they will be included in the attacking army.
