MR EDWARD CULLEN The death occurred suddenly yesterday at his home on Richmond street, of Mr. Edward Cullen in his sixty-eighth year. Though he had not been enjoying the best of health for some time, Mr. Cullen was about as usual yesterday morning and attended eleven o'clock Mass at St. Dunstan's Cathedral. Arriving home, however, he took a weak tea, and, although receiving the best medical attention, died shortly afterwards from heart failure.

There are left to mourn, besides a sorrowing widow, one daughter, Adele, at home, and two sons Edward, now in Sydney, who will arrive home for the funeral, and Alphonse in Cuba. The funeral takes place tomorrow morning at 8.45 a. m. from his late residence, thence to St. Dunstan's Cathedral. Interment will be in the Roman Catholic Cemetery.

THE MARKETS

MONTREAL, Dec 7—There was no improvement in the foreign demand for Canadian grain here on Saturday and the market in consequence was dull. The trade in car lots for domestic and country account was also slow, but the tone of the market was steady, except Ontario malting barley, which was one cent per bushel lower. Car lots of No. 3 extra were quoted at \$1.06 and No. 3 grade at \$1.05 extra. Ontario No. 2 white oats sold at 62 cents No. 3 grade at 60 cents and No. 4 grade at 59 cents per bushel ex store. There was some demand from the United Kingdom for Canadian spring wheat flour and as the prices bid in some cases were satisfactory to millers, a small volume of business was transacted by December shipment from West St. John. The demand of the local trade was limited and prices were unchanged. The winter wheat situation was also quiet, but the feeling was steady. The tone of the market for all lines of millfeeds was firm and the volume of business was large, although no change occurred in rolled oats. The trade in eggs continued active and prices were well maintained. The demand for butter from the United Kingdom was very quiet, but some sales of fresh made creamery were with United States buyers. The cheese section was without any new feature to note. The demand for crop beans continued good, but prices were reduced 3 cents per bushel selling at \$2.65 to \$2.75 for one pound pickers.

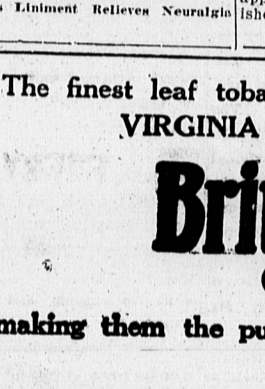
Nurmi Declines Long Distance Race With Ritola NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—It is now a sure thing that America will not get to see a repetition of the thrilling Olympic race between Pavvo Nurmi and Willie Ritola in the 500 meters. Nurmi is on his way to this country from England. Ritola is already here. The two are to compete in indoor meets.

Nurmi is known as the iron man of the track, due to his endurance feats. But America must be content to see him in the minor events. Nurmi will confine his running to the mile and the mile and a half. Ritola is said to be willing to meet his countryman in the longer races but Nurmi will have none of it. "I don't care to burn myself out," he explains. Nurmi beat Ritola in the Olympic 5000 meters. It was one of the greatest races of the gigantic athletic carnival.
