New Passenger Carrying Plane For Service Here

Newest in passenger-carrying aircraft a DeHavilland Rapid which combines speed and luxury has been placed at the service of the public on the Charlottetown-Summerside-Moncton route by the Canadian Airways. The plane is equipped with twin six cylinder Gypsy Major motors and has a cruising speed of 140 miles an hour.

Pilot Walter Fowler expertly demonstrated the latest addition to the Upton Airport to a group of press-representatives yesterday on a special flight over the Island. The ease with which the dual motor equipped ship took off was comfort itself and soon the passengers relaxed to enjoy a panoramic view, as the plane itself which weighs 3100 pounds, and with a full complement of 10 passengers and luggage 5200 pounds. It has a wing span of 48 feet, and can be flown with only one motor functioning. Pilot R. H. Biddy who flew the plane from Toronto stopped off at Quebec and Moncton en route. The final stage of the flight from Moncton to Upton Airport was made in half an hour the fastest flight between the Air points. The Rapid will replace the Dragon which is being used in Photographic work in New Brunswick.
